HIBBARD RESIGNS, NORENE APPOINTED



RONALD V. NORENE,
NEWLY-APPOINTED TRUSTEE

Trustee Richard L. Hibbard has resigned from the Board of Trustees after 10 years of active service to the Village. He was elected Trustee in 1977, having served earlier as Bicentennial Commission chairman and a member of the Plan Commission.

He has also been active in the Grove Heritage Association, the celebration of Glenview's 75th Anniversary, the Glenview

Area Historical Society, and the United Fund, in addition to many other groups and associations. He will remain active with the Historical Society.

Completing Hibbard's unexpired term is Ronald V. Norene, who will serve as appointed Trustee until the end of April, 1981. An independent municipal finance consultant for the past 16 years, he has assisted Glenview in financing the Library, the Police Administration Building, the Lake Street water reservoir, the acquisition of the two well-water companies, and the Lake Michigan water-transmission lines. He holds a degree in Business Administration from the University of Michigan, and formed his own consultant service in 1978.

Norene holds membership in the Chicago Municipal Analysts Society, the Chicago Bond Club, the Investment Analysts Society, and the Illinois Municipal Finance Officers' Association. He is an associate member of the National Finance Officers' Association and a designated Public Arbitrator (by the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board).

Locally, he has served in his homeowners' association, the 1970 American Cancer Society drive, and fund-raising activities at the Glenview Community Church. He and his wife Paula have lived in Glenview for 15 years and are parents of a daughter, Kristin.

PUBLIC MEETING TO DISCUSS SEWER STUDY

On Tuesday, February 19, at 8 PM, there will be a meeting in the Board Room of the Village Hall to discuss the current study of the problem of infiltration of surface water to the Village's sanitary-sewer system.

The Federal government requires that any overloading of the system through such infiltration be corrected as soon as possible, as Glenview's sewage enters the Metropolitan Sanitary District system for processing.

The meeting will examine ways and means of correcting the overload. Your views could be important, and you are invited to come and express them at this time.

DOG AND CAT LICENSES HAVE EXPIRED

If you keep a dog or a cat, please *come to the Village Hall now* and get your 1980 pet license. If you can't make the trip, please call 724-1700 and request the necessary forms by mail. The 1980 pet licenses *must be obtained by Friday, February 29, so hurry!*

In past years the Village Hall has mailed out pet license applications with vehicle sticker applications, but this year for the first time the current stickers are valid until June 30, whereas pet licenses have already expired.

When you come to the Village Hall for your pet license, please remember to bring a current rabies-immunity certificate for each animal, plus evidence (a note or certificate from your veterinarian) of alteration if a pet has been neutered. (These may be mailed in and will be returned with tags, if you are handling the matter by mail.) There is a fee of \$3 for an altered pet, and \$5 for a non-altered animal.

DRUG WORKSHOPS SET

Youth Services of Glenview, in cooperation with the Glenview Optimists Club, is sponsoring drug-education workshops for young people of high-school age, beginning Friday, February 22, from 3:30 to 5 PM, and running for six weeks. They will be held in the Maynard Room of the Glenview Public Library.

The purpose of the series is to provide facts about psychological and physiological effects of drugs, the risks involved, the reasons for drug use, and alternatives.

Each week's format includes a film about a certain class of drugs, followed by discussion led by Youth Services staff members. Pamphlets will be distributed at each meeting.

GLENVIEW SALT TALK

Residents sometimes call our Public Works Department during the winter months to ask where and when Village trucks do salting in slippery weather. Here is the Salt Policy:

When weather conditions require, *all main streets are salted*, including some of those that are technically under State maintenance for other services. In addition to main arteries, *all intersections, curves and hills* are salted, but NOT sidestreets or cul-de-sacs.

In answer to those who believe we should salt the surface of every street: Salt is not only expensive, but also a pollutant, killing vegetation and finding its way eventually into rivers and streams. Judicious use of salt is important, not only to the Village budget, but to the environment of the United States, Glenview especially.

MAINTENANCE OF HOME FIRE ALARMS

Home fire alarms and smoke detectors need testing on a regular schedule. Test your battery-operated unit when you return from vacation to make sure the batteries are still good. (Warning signals to let you know when power is failing are designed to last for only a certain number of days. Your unit may have been beeping to an empty house while you were away.)

If your wired-in or plugged-in detector has a test button, pressing it will tell you only that the electrical circuit is operational, not that the alarm is working. To test the alarm properly, feed smoke directly into it and see whether it goes off. (A small torch of rolled and twisted waxed paper, blown out and held directly under the detector should yield enough smoke for the test. Have a basin of water with you for safety's sake.)

Your alarm unit also needs cleaning on a regular schedule, in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, which should be printed somewhere on the unit. Remove the cover and you should find them with no difficulty.

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MAKE SURE NO ONE WALKS ON YOUR SWIMMING POOL! Under the snow the ice has thawed, and anyone stepping onto it will surely get an icy bath. (This has already happened once that we know of.) A child could easily be drowned. Please take whatever precautions are necessary to prevent an accident of this kind on your property.

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FREE IDENTIFICATION TAGS for key rings, courtesy of the Jaycees, are now in fresh supply at the Police Administration Building. Stop either at the desk inside or at the drive-up window and ask for yours. The tag bears a serial number exclusively yours, and no one but the Police Department will know whose keys they are. If they are lost, they can be mailed back to police, who will let you know. Why not take advantage of this?

MARCH BLOOD DONATIONS IMPORTANT

If you are eligible to donate blood, Glenview Blood Central and the North Suburban Blood Center need your help.

Participation in January's community blood drive fell well below expectations. During March, blood will be needed because projected collection throughout the region is lower than anticipated needs at the 14 hospitals in the area.

Glenview residents can make the important difference in blood supplies for the entire region by donating at the March drive on Tuesday, March 11, from 3 to 7 PM, at the Fire Station, 1815 Glenview Road. Please call 724-1700 for your appointment.

Eligible blood donors should be healthy people between 17 and 65 who weigh at least 110 pounds. Eat normally — fasting is no longer required.

Fred Grabo, Sr., the Police Department Crossing Guard at Lake Avenue and Scott Foresman, is the former Fire Chief of the Deerfield-Bannockburn Fire Department, with which he served for 19 years. He has also worked for Hawthorn Melody Dairy and the Glenview Bus Company.

He and his wife Leone, married for 53 years, have lived in Glenview since 1961, and are parents of two sons, Fred, Jr. (who retired from our Police Department after 28 years of service) and Don (custodian at Louise Henking School). There are 5 Grabo grandchildren.

Crossing Guards perform a valuable service to the community in protecting the lives of pedestrians. There is no way that Glenview could afford to have police officers on duty four or five hours a day, five days a week, for such work. (In fact, there are more school intersections in Glenview than there are police officers on duty on any one shift.) Motorists are asked to respect the authority of our Crossing Guards, who take their work very seriously and protect the lives of your children going to and from school.

Guards average \$85 a week in salary — very helpful to many families. Both men and women of all ages are eligible to apply. If you are interested in such work, please call the Police Department at 729-5000. If a position is not open, your name will be placed on the reserve list.
