WERE YOU COUNTED?

If you have not yet been counted in the 1980 Census, either by mail or by a Census Enumerator, please call Village Manager Robert van Deusen immediately, at 724-1700.

It would also be appreciated if you report the name and address of any other Village resident who has not been counted.

The reason for municipal interest is that any Glenview resident who is missed causes a loss to the Village of \$400 in Federal and State revenues over the next ten years. A family of five, therefore, would cost Glenview \$2,000 in lost revenues during the 1980's, if not counted.

DELINQUENT WATER USERS TO BE CHARGED

At the May 19 Board Meeting, Glenview Trustees voted to charge delinquent water customers on a per-visit basis — \$25 for the first visit of a Water Department employee, and \$10 per visit thereafter, for as many visits as are necessary.

When a customer does not pay the water bill, he or she is notified of the Water Department's intent to turn off the water on a certain date.

If the bill is not paid before the specified shut-off date, a Water Department employee visits the premises to turn off the water. This initial visit costs the customer \$25. If valid payment of the money due, plus \$25, is paid at the time of the first visit, the water will not be turned off. But, in case of invalid payment (*i.e.*, if the check bounces), a Water Department employee will come again to turn off the water — and \$10 more is added to the charges due. If three or more visits are necessary, each costs \$10 more.

Because the overwhelming majority of customers do pay their water bills on time, enforcement of collection from delinquents is necessary in order to avoid rate increases affecting all customers.

BLOOD DRAWING TUESDAY, JULY 8

The next blood drawing will be held Tuesday, July 8, from 3 to 7 PM, at the Fire Station, 1815 Glenview Road.

To be eligible to donate blood, you should be in good health on the day of donation, weigh at least 110 pounds, and be between 17 and 65.

Becoming a blood donor gives you the satisfaction of knowing that your single unit (one pint) of blood can benefit as many as three people in need of blood transfusions. Thanks to component therapy, a patient now receives only the portion of blood needed — making for better patient health and more efficient blood use.

Blood needs can be met only by human donors. Please volunteer if you are eligible to do so. Call Glenview Blood Central, 724-1700, and make your appointment for July 8.

Winners of 1979 Civic Awards, honored at the annual Civic Awards Night on May 15, were as follows:

- CITIZEN OF THE YEAR, William J. Attea (Superintendent of School District 34 - Glenview elementary schools), for outstanding service toward the betterment of the Village.
- YOUTH OF THE YEAR, Thomas C. Nelson (Glenbrook South High School student), for leadership in youth activities and services to the community.
- PUBLIC SAFETY AWARD, Michael O'Connell (Sergeant, Glenview Police Department), for services above and beyond the call of duty.
- PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD, Karen London (Glenview Police Department Social Worker), for good citizenship in support of public safety.

DURING THE MONTH OF MAY

The Glenview Trustees • • •

- ★ Amended the rules regarding charges for visits of Water Department personnel to properties of delinquent water customers. (See article on Page 1.)
- ★ Amended the plumbing code to conform to the State code regarding public water supply.
- ★ Approved an addition to the contract (\$26,000, 70% of which comes from a Federal grant) with Harza Engineering Company for the infiltration and inflow study required by the Metropolitan Sanitary District.
- ★ Accepted the bid of J. A. Johnson of Arlington Heights (\$19,112.50) for resurfacing of the Police Department parking lot.
- ★ Increased (by \$5,000, 85% of which comes from State and Federal funds) the allotment for the Phase I study of the Harlem-Central design, and approved Phase II, for plans and specifications (\$122,000, 85% of which comes from State and Federal funds).
- ★ Approved an updated Techny Area Plan, reflecting changes due to construction of retention basins.
- ★ Approved a one-lot resubdivision at 303 Waukegan Road.
- ★ Approved relocation of a commercial ground sign in the public right-of-way at 1836 Glenview Road.
- ★ Rezoned 5½ acres at 3325 Potter and 3920 Gimi-dieff from R-1 to R-4 (residential classifications).
- ★ Approved an entertainment license (for a pianist) at 1432 Waukegan Road.
- ★ Established a policy to limit live entertainment to hours of liquor sales.
- ★ Exchanged ten parking spaces in the Commuter Plaza (on land leased from the railroad) with the adjacent business establishment.
- ★ Established stop intersections: for east-bound traffic on Jefferson at Waukegan Road, and for south-bound traffic on Monroe at Chestnut.
- ★ Prohibited parking in the first 100 feet of the east side of Church Street north of Glenview Road.
- ★ Restricted parking at certain times on the west side of Elm between Glenview Road and Henley Street.
- ★ Accepted three water-main easements.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS . . .

OWNERS OF VACANT PROPERTY are reminded that it is illegal to permit weed growth higher than 8 inches, or any other unsightly or unhealthy conditions within Village limits. Please keep your vacant property mowed and cleaned of debris.

IT IS AGAINST THE LAW to carry garbage cans out to the parkway or pavement. Household waste in garbage cans is picked up only at your service door (or other accessible spot within your lot lines). Yard debris may be placed on the parkway no earlier than after dark on the night before collection, provided it is in *disposable containers*.

HOW TO DETECT DUTCH ELM DISEASE



Detection of Dutch Elm Disease is not, unfortunately, as easy as looking for a buzzard in the branches, but there are certain signs to watch for: wilting, yellowing and drying of foliage (after which leaves fall off and the branch dies).

Infected trees can die within weeks, though some hang on for years, transmitting the deadly fungus to nearby elms via the elm beetle.

If you see the signs described above, be they on a privately-owned tree or a parkway tree, please phone Public Works immediately, 724-1700. The crews are trained to recognize symptoms of the disease and take samples for lab analysis.

HOW TO PREVENT CRIME . . .
