DEALING WITH VANDALISM

Vandalism — criminal damage to property — causes problems everywhere, but one of the biggest is this: *victims don't know what to do when vandalism strikes.*

We know this is true in Glenview because of the number of telephone calls received by the Village Manager from residents who are generally disgruntled but *have not reported anything to the police.*

Police Chief William P. Bartlett, himself, has had people casually mention property damage at some vague time in the past. He always asks, "Did you report it?" and the usual answer is, "No, I didn't think it would do any good."

WRONG!

In the first place, *it is your duty as a citizen* to report any crime to the police, as soon as it is discovered. If you see vandalism in action, call the police emergency number, 724-2131. Officers might be able to track down the vandals immediately.

If you find vandalism already committed (such as tire tracks across a lawn or other damage done during the night), call the police non-emergency number, 729-5000. Make a report of exactly what the damage is and when you discovered it. Police then can establish a time frame. Vandalism often strikes in patterns, but police have no way of knowing what the patterns are unless the damage is promptly reported.

It is not only your duty as a citizen to report crime of any sort, but if you are entitled to compensation from an insurance company, you must establish the fact that you have reported the crime to local police.

Our Police Department has recently held two important meetings, one with school representatives, social agencies and the Youth Commission, and the other with representatives of property owners' associations. The main thrust of the meetings was *how to get the public to cooperate in reporting vandalism promptly.*

Please help by doing your duty as a citizen and REPORTING VANDALISM PROMPTLY TO THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. With everyone's help, Glenview can solve more of its vandalism problems.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS • • •

PARKWAY TREES PLANTED LAST FALL should be treated as follows this summer: MIX IN THE MULCH at the base of the trunk with a fork or hoe, and keep the base cultivated to allow water and air to get to the roots. LEAVE WRAPPING ON the trunk until it falls off by itself (usually in about two years). It protects the tree from sun scald and mower damage. DO NOT OVERWATER. When the soil is so dry it won't stick together when you squeeze it, then it is time to water thoroughly. DO NOT FERTILIZE. Enough fertilizer was placed in the original ball to nourish the tree through this year, and adding more will kill off new roots. Call Public Works, 724-1700, if you have questions.

KEEP WATCHING ELM TREES for evidence of Dutch Elm Disease - wilting, yellowing and dying of foliage. If you see these symptoms, either on park-

way or privately owned trees, please call Public Works immediately, at 724-1700. Trained personnel will take tree samples immediately.

WARM WEATHER AND PICNICS go together, but the possibility of food poisoning goes along too. Our Village Sanitarian reminds you that HOT foods must be kept very hot (140°F) and COLD foods must be kept very cold (below 45°F). Many inexpensive insulating containers are on the market - make sure you're well supplied for picnicking.

BACKYARD COOKOUTS will be more sanitary and enjoyable if you keep your property bug-free. Make sure your garbage cans are tightly covered and all animal excrement is removed from the ground immediately.

VACANT PROPERTY MUST BE MOWED in the summer time to keep weed growth under eight inches. Also, make sure your vacant lots are free from other debris that could breed hazardous conditions.

VIAL-OF-LIFE FREE OFFER STILL ON

Free Vial-of-Life kits are available now at the Village Hall, the Fire Station, the Police Department, the Senior Center and Glenbrook Hospital.

When you pick yours up, ask for as many medical forms as there are members of your family. Fill out the forms and place them in the vial, which should be kept in the refrigerator. A sticker for the outside of the refrigerator door is provided.

In case of emergency, rescuers can go directly to the refrigerator to find complete medical histories of victims — a great help in saving lives in cases of accidents or sudden illnesses.

RETIRED SENIOR VOLUNTEER PROGRAM INSURANCE

Senior citizens doing volunteer work of any kind should be enrolled in the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (known as RSVP), a federally funded program offering insurance protection, at no charge, to people age 60 and older, while they are performing volunteer assignments.

Coverage includes accident, personal liability, and excess automobile liability. *It is not a substitute for any insurance already carried,* and applies only while a person is engaged in volunteer duties.

The Federal government believes it appropriate that the satisfaction and appreciation experienced in volunteer work be supported by the comfort of knowing there is financial help in case of accidents. If you are interested in enrolling in RSVP, call Betty Barnes at 729-0821.

HELP RID GLENVIEW OF MOSQUITOES

Mosquitoes need water in which to breed. Some females lay eggs in standing water, where they hatch within a couple of days. Others lay eggs in dry receptacles (house gutters, outdoor containers — any hollow place capable of holding liquid), where the eggs remain until covered by water.

Larvae of both types of eggs grow into pupae, which then split their skins and produce adult mosquitoes whose bites cause discomfort at best, and several serious diseases at worst.

The only kind of standing water that is safe to have on your property is a fish pond stocked with hungry fish that will eat mosquito larvae. All other standing water, including children's plastic wading pools and pets' water dishes, should be emptied and stored indoors when not in use. Bird baths should be scrubbed out and refilled at least once a week.

The pitch of your house gutters should not allow for standing water. Flat roofs should drain properly after a rain. Make sure there are no outdoor faucets or pipes that leak. Move drain hoses frequently to prevent puddles of standing water.

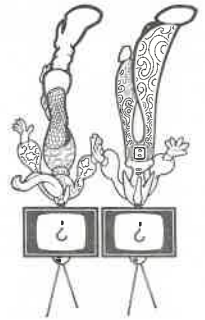

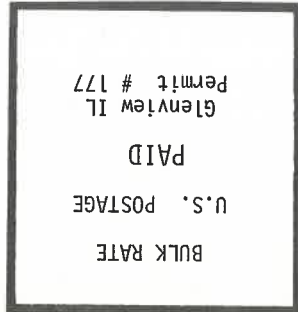

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES . . .

- Agreed to raise Commuter Plaza parking fees (from \$15 to \$30 per quarter for permits and from 25¢ to 50¢ for meters), effective November 24, when applications of residents will be accepted for 1981. New fees will bring Glenview into conformance with other suburbs, who have been charging the higher rates for some time. Money collected for Commuter Plaza parking is earmarked for future improvements in commuter parking.
- Accepted the bid of George D. Hardin, Inc., of Forest Park (\$323,142.25) for water mains on Glendale and Greenwood.
- Accepted the bid of D & L Office Furniture of Chicago (\$2,632.40) for drafting tables and plan files for the new Village Hall.
- Increased the minimum for sealed bids from \$1,500 to \$3,000.
- Amended the plumbing code to permit polyvinyl choride pipe for drain lines above ground.
- Amended the building code to permit single ex-its in multiple-family housing units, when certain safeguards are installed.
- Amended the zoning ordinance to transfer outdoor storage restrictions from "Standards" to "Bulk Regulations."
- Amended the definition of A and B liquor-pour-ing licenses to remove package sales.
- Annexed approximately eight acres at 630 Dear-love Road, rezoning it for industrial use.
- Annexed a small parcel (25 by 75 feet) for part of Carol Estates Unit #2, and approved the six-lot subdivision at 3701 Glenview Road.
- Approved Four Columns Subdivision (1852, 1854 and 1870 Elmdale).

- Established Swainwood as Special Service Area Number 1 (for purposes of special taxation for a street-lighting project).
- Authorized three-way stops on Highland Lane at Crestwood and at Knollwood.
- Vacated an undeveloped easement for public walkway in Glengrove Acres.
- Denied an extension (from 2 to 3 AM) of open hours on Friday nights for holders of Class B liquor-pouring licenses.

HOME NURSING SERVICES AVAILABLE

The Visiting Nurse Association meets home health needs of people in all age groups and all economic situations, and for all kinds of health problems.

Services include registered nursing, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, home health aids and medical social work. Laboratory and oxygen service and equipment can be provided with at least one of the above. All services are in accordance with treatment requested and approved by a physician.

Your Medicare and private insurance may be used to reimburse you for expenses incurred. A sliding fee scale is available, thanks to the support of the United Way of Glenview. Call the Visiting Nurse Association at 328-1900 or 677-6164.

BIKE SAFETY INCLUDES YIELDING the right-of-way to pedestrians. You may ride your bike on public sidewalks, EXCEPT IN THE BUSINESS DISTRICT, as long as you are courteous to pedestrians and give them adequate warning of your approach.
