WEISS IS NEW GLENVIEW TRUSTEE



James M. Weiss, a six-year resident of Glenview, was sworn in as Village Trustee last month. He was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Robert W. Kustra, who resigned.

1981 PARKING PERMITS

Glenview residents may buy one-year Commuter Plaza parking permits during the last five business days of November (Thursday, November 20; Friday, November 21; Monday, November 24; Tuesday, November 25; and Thursday, November 26) for \$120.

Anyone, resident or not, may purchase *quarterly* Commuter Parking permits starting December 1 for \$30 (good from January 1 through March 31, 1981).

Yes, the fees are higher than last year, but let us explain: The money will be placed in a reserve fund for future parking-lot improvements, and *not* spent for any purpose other than to improve commuter parking.

POLICE CHIEF WILLIAM P. BARTLETT RESIGNS

Glenview's Police Chief for the past 16 years, William P. Bartlett, has submitted his resignation, effective January 1 of next year, in compliance with the Village policy governing the retirement age for police and fire personnel.

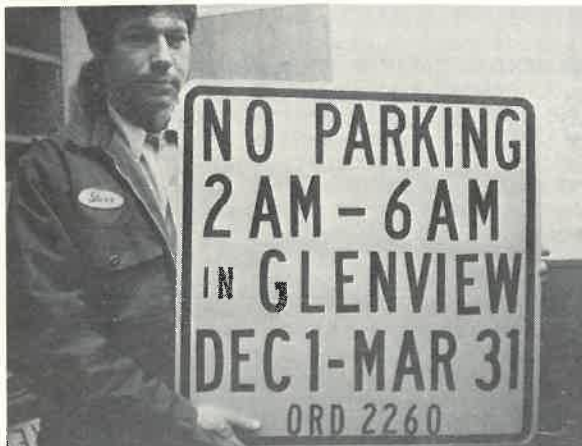


His service to Glenview has covered the most important growth period of the Village, and Chief Bartlett has successfully accomplished the building of an excellent modern police force to keep up with community and municipal development.

Under Chief Bartlett the police force has been completely reorganized, adding a full-time social worker, specialists in juvenile, criminal and traffic investigations, a community-relations specialist, the Officer Friendly program for the school children, and an animal control warden.

Bartlett's influence has also been felt in community-at-large affairs, as it was he who initiated the annual civic awards for civilians and public safety personnel rendering outstanding service to Glenview. *(Continued on next page)*

NO OVERNIGHT STREET PARKING DURING WINTER

Upon retirement Bartlett will have completed 39 years of police work, having served the Evanston Police Department for 23 years prior to coming to Glenview. "I don't regret a moment of it," says Bill Bartlett. "It has been a rich and rewarding experience."

OFFICIAL WATER-QUALITY CONTROL NOTICE

(As required by Chapter 6 of the Illinois Pollution Control Board Rules and Regulations)

Glenview is required by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to collect 52 water samples every month from various locations throughout the Village. Forty-six of the samples are sent to a local State-approved laboratory for analysis, and the remaining six are sent to the IEPA laboratory.

All public water suppliers in the State are mandated by Chapter 6 of the Illinois Pollution Control Board Rules and Regulations to notify consumers publicly whenever sample results indicate that the maximum allowable concentration for bacteriological quality is exceeded.

During the week of August 20-26, though there was no emergency situation, there were six unsatisfactory and nine questionable sample reports. IEPA was consulted, and an investigation and re-sampling program was instituted by both Glenview and the IEPA. Additional water samples, taken on two consecutive days, proved satisfactory. Twelve samples taken by IEPA on August 29, 1980, tested as satisfactory.

Based upon the pattern of the sample results, system pressure and system chlorine concentrations, Glenview officials concluded that the questionable and unsatisfactory sample results were attributable either to contamination of the bottles used in sampling or to an error in laboratory procedures.

POLICE WARNING

Now that darkness comes early and holiday shopping is near, please take extra precautions to prevent being robbed or burglarized. Park your car only in well-lighted areas. Put all purchases in the trunk of your car, never on the back seat where they can be seen. LOCK YOUR CAR whenever and wherever you leave it.

Increase security measures at home. Keep the garage door closed and LOCKED except when in use — same goes for house doors and windows.

Thieves know no season, but they also know that the pickings are extra good between now and the first of the year. Be warned!

DRIVER TRAINING is held every-other month at the Center. Advance registration is required. Call for dates of the next sessions and to register.

EXERCISE UNLIMITED is held every Tuesday at noon. This is an exercise program especially for seniors, but if you want a more advanced workout there are Park District programs with a 20% discount for seniors. Inquire at Rugen.

THE SENIOR CITIZEN COMMISSION meets every month (first Wednesday, 3 PM) at the Village Hall, and all meetings are open to the public. Among topics discussed are housing, cycling safety, health and legal problems. PLEASE CALL THE VILLAGE HALL before attending a meeting, as occasionally they are postponed or held at another time.

QUILTING CLASSES, both beginning and advanced, begin in January. No charge except for materials used. Advance registration required.

BATTERY-POWERED MOWERS POSSIBLE HAZARDS

If you own a battery-powered electric lawn mower, it could be a fire hazard when stored for the winter. Black & Decker, Inc., and the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission have issued a warning for 18,000 battery-powered lawn mowers sold between January of 1976 and August of this year.

The orange-and-white machines may burst into flame during storage, according to the Safety Commission, though there are no reports of fires when the machines are in use.

If you have a battery-powered machine with the words "19-inch Cordless Twin Mower" on the plastic housing next to the battery, REMOVE THE FUSES from the battery before storing the mower. If you want more information or instructions, call this toll-free number: 800-638-3830.

During the month of October

- Amended the zoning ordinance to permit heliports in hospital and office/research zones as a conditional use (subject to public hearing, recommendation and Village Board approval).
- Granted a contract (\$205,094.04, to Di Paolo of Niles) for paving and water-main replacement on Linneman Street.
- Approved \$24,905 in Motor Fuel Tax funds for Glenview's share of the repair of the Milwaukee Road grade crossing at Glenview Road.
- Approved replacement of an aerial ladder (from Seagrave Company of Wisconsin, \$20,000) for Truck #10 of the Fire Department.
- Granted a contract (\$18,142, to T. & W. Edmier) for the enlargement of Plaza del Prado's detention pond and the filling of Miller Basin.
- Prohibited parking on the east side of Waukegan Road between Topp Lane and Winnetka Avenue, and stopping or standing south of Winnetka Avenue for a distance of 533 feet.
- Restricted parking to 30 minutes on both sides of Prairie Street from Pine to the Milwaukee tracks, between 8 PM and 8 AM Monday through Saturday.
- Approved a four-way stop at Pine and Grove.
- Rezoned the rear two acres at 1253 Milwaukee Avenue from residential to office/research use.
- Approved public hearings for sanitary sewer and water-main improvements on Woodlawn east of Waukegan Road, to be held on Thursday, November 20, at 8 PM, in the new Village Hall.
- Approved a five-lot subdivision at 3905 Country-side Lane.
- Approved a one-lot subdivision at 4045 Crestwood.
- Annexed 4221 West Lake Avenue.
- Accepted an easement from School District 63 for a water main on Harrison Street.
- Prohibited, as of October 20, introduction of any more changeable-copy signs within Village limits, except for gasoline-price signs.
- Granted permission for First Trust & Savings Bank employees to use 10 parking spaces behind the new Village Hall.

THE VILLAGE BOARD filed a formal objection with Cook County to the rezoning (from residential) of the southwest corner of Greenwood and Golf (unincorporated Maine Township) for a drive-in bank and professional building.

ALL GLENVIEW WATER CUSTOMERS have been receiving pure Lake Michigan water since Tuesday, October 21.

LIBRARY BOARD POSITIONS

The terms of three Library Board members, Charles H. Davis (president), Herbert L. Furse and William F. Stevens, will expire in April of 1981.

If you are interested in being elected to the Library Board, you may obtain a petition for filing at the Village Hall or from Library Secretary Jo-Ann Schrieffer. Petitions must be signed by at least 50 adult residents of Glenview, and must be filed in January. (Candidates must, of course, be Glenview residents.) The term of office is six years, unless, as the present board is now considering, it is shortened to four years before the next election.

The Library Board meets Monthly (on the third Tuesday evening) at the Library, sets policy, adopts annual budgets, and determines the extent of library services. The current board is studying the adequacy of the present Library building.

GARBAGE-PICKUP SCHEDULE FOR THANKSGIVING

During Thanksgiving week (November 24-29), Thursday customers of NORTHFIELD, BROWNING-FERRIS and BROOKS disposal companies will have pickups on Friday, November 28. BROOKS Friday customers will have pickups on Tuesday, November 25, only.

BEST Thursday twice-a-week customers will have service on Monday only, and Thursday once-a-week customers will have pickups on both Monday, November 24, and Monday, December 1.

NEW NORTRAN-MILWAUKEE EQUIPMENT

A new signal system called Centralized Traffic Control now enables Milwaukee Road trains to be switched with complete safety.

Trains between Chicago and Rondout (a few miles north of Glenview) now have CTC signals in both directions on both tracks. When "crossovers" (moving of trains from one set of tracks to a parallel set) are necessary, they can now be accomplished without delays in commuter traffic or risks to passengers.
