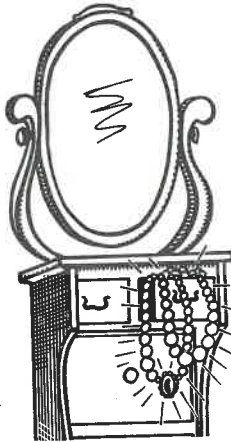
IS YOUR HOUSE OR BUSINESS ROBBERY PRONE?

To find out whether your house or place of business is well protected against thieves and burglars, have a FREE SECURITY INSPECTION by members of the Glenview Police Department.

Call Commander Lawrence Andersen of our Community Services Division, at 729-5000, and make an appointment for the inspection.

"The average burglary costs the victim about a thousand dollars," says Commander Andersen, adding that having a ten-dollar lock on the door of an eighty-thousand-dollar house is like buying re-tread tires for a Rolls Royce.

In just a few minutes, police inspectors can tell you where your security problems are and how to correct them. While police may not be able to prevent crime, they can show you how to persuade burglars to go elsewhere, by making Glenview break-ins as tough as possible.

ANIMAL CONTROL LAWS

Glenview has both a leash law and a P.S. law, which means that when your dog is off your own property it must be ON A LEASH, and when you are walking it you must CARRY A POOPER-SCOOPER and USE IT to pick up all excrement deposited during the walk. You are in for a fine if you don't comply.

The Village Hall has had several complaints of dogs running loose since the spring weather began. Our Animal Control Warden has impounded those he has been able to catch. Take proper care of your dog - it is irresponsible to let the animal run loose, be netted and impounded. The dog doesn't know the law, but YOU are supposed to know it and obey it!

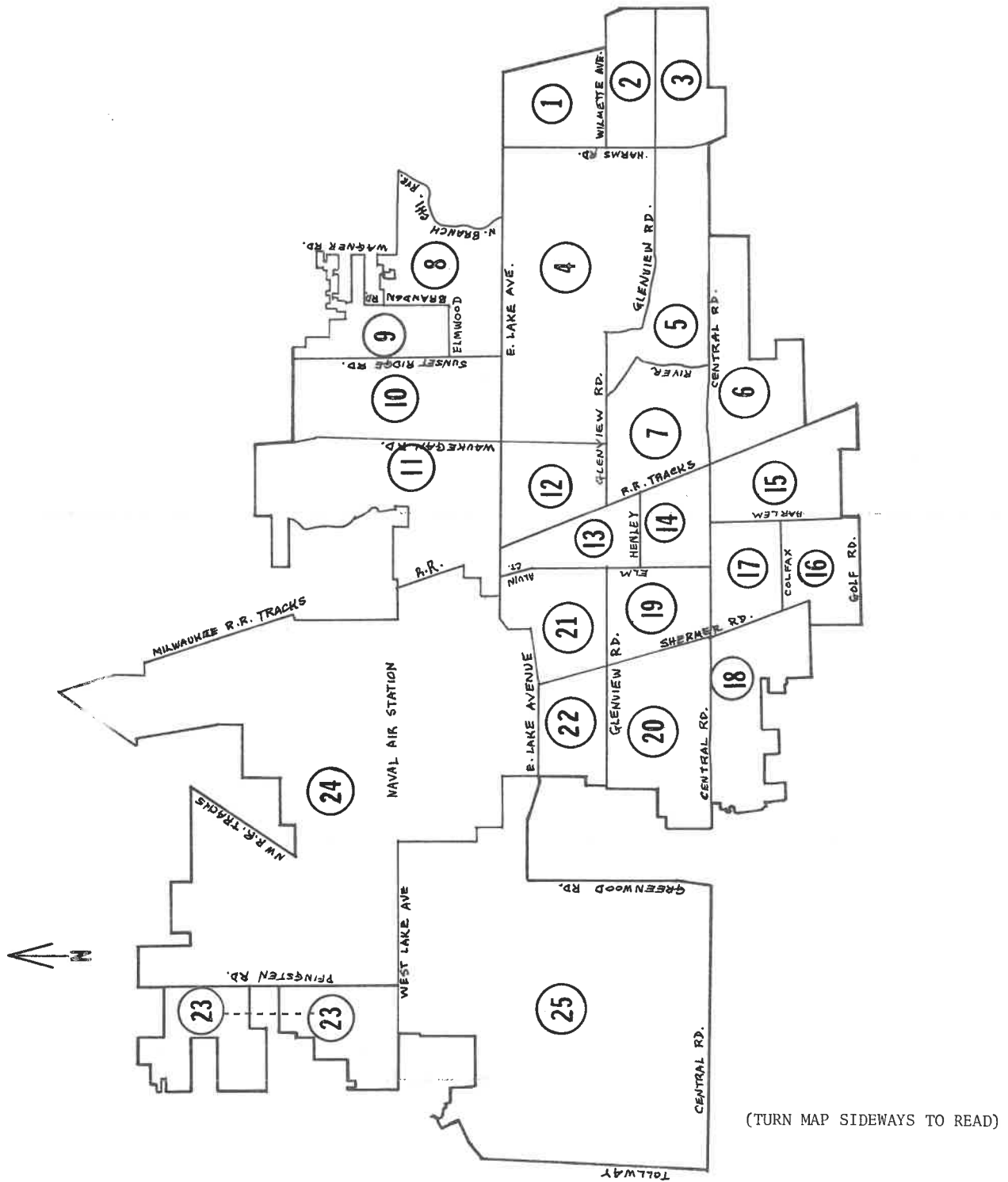
MEALS-AT-HOME VOLUNTEERS WANTED

Glenbrook Meals at Home, a program providing meals for house-bound people in the Glenview-Northfield-Northbrook area, needs dependable volunteers with cars to make deliveries several times a month on a regular schedule.

Volunteers take one hot meal and one cold meal on a single delivery to each elderly or handicapped shut-in, making it possible for such people to live independently for as long as possible, even though unable to shop or cook for themselves. Meals are prepared at Glenbrook Hospital and St. Ann's Home.

Men, women and husband-and-wife teams willing to deliver food should call Glenbrook Meals at Home, 724-6210. Direct contact with clients is part of the service, so be prepared to deliver a warm smile and some words of comfort and cheer along with the food. Those now performing the service find it very rewarding. (Perhaps you will need such service yourself someday, if you are fortunate enough to enjoy a long life.)

VILLAGE BOARD ACTION DURING MARCH

- Confirmed the sale of \$950,000 in municipal bonds to Sears B&T Co., Associates, at a net interest rate of 5.399% for the new Village Hall.
- Accepted the bid of C&L Paving of Lincolnshire (\$25,200) for removal and replacement of 5,000 square feet of concrete sidewalk and 1,000 lineal feet of curbs and gutters at various locations.
- Adopted 4 resolutions for a grant application for Federal funds for 75% of the cost of an infiltration and inflow study of our sewer system, as required by the Metropolitan Sanitary District.
- Approved a revised concept plan for a multiple-family development on the north side of Chestnut Avenue (Lutter property), involving 236 units divided among three 5-story buildings, one 3-story building, and one 4-story building, lower buildings to be placed nearest to Valley Lo.
- Approved a concept for development at 2001 Waukegan Road (Grundstrom property), involving two existing single-family houses and 150 multiple-family dwellings to be built, on 14.3 acres.
- Approved two single-family residential lots (R-4) at 3831 Crestwood.
- Zoned recently annexed property (44 lots) at 4301 Pynsky Road single-family residential (R-4) as per annexation agreement.
- Approved engineering agreement with Schumacher & Svoboda for ornamental street lighting, as requested by the Swainwood Homeowners' Association.
- Approved a July 4 fireworks display at the Park District golf course.
- Accepted a bid (\$5300) from North Shore Motors for one AMC Spirit for Police Department use.
- Received the report of the special committee investigating the need for a building maintenance code. (Committee recommended that such a code is not needed in Glenview at this time.)
- Vacated a storm-sewer easement at 1500 Waukegan Road (Pebblecreek).
- Passed an ordinance to hold the Municipal Election on April 17.

A PETITION REQUESTING A PROPOSITION for the April 17 ballot (that the maximum rate for the General Corporate Fund be established at .4337% instead of .5783%) was rejected, because the State statute does not apply to Home Rule units of government.

NORTH SHORE ECOLOGY is now operating our Recycling Center at 1237 Waukegan Road. Only paper and glass are accepted - NO CANS, please.

Glenview's 12th annual Civic Awards Night dinner will be held on Thursday, May 24, at the North Shore Country Club. Tickets are available at the Chamber of Commerce, 1545 Waukegan Road, \$12.50 each.

The event is sponsored each year by local service clubs - Rotary, Lions, Kiwanis, Optimists, and the Chamber of Commerce.

Four presentations will be made:

- THE GLENVIEW YOUTH AWARD - to a resident of high-school age who has significantly contributed to school, family or community life by helping others *outside the normal course of events*, serving as a good example to other young people.
- THE CITIZEN OF THE YEAR AWARD - to someone who either lives or works in Glenview who has performed *outstanding community service benefiting a large number of people*. (Elected officials and Village employees are not eligible for this award.)
- THE PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD - to someone who has given *direct support to public authorities or performed an outstanding act of bravery*. (Police officers and firefighters are not eligible for this award.)
- THE PUBLIC SAFETY AWARD - to a police officer or firefighter who has performed *an outstanding act or service in line of duty*.

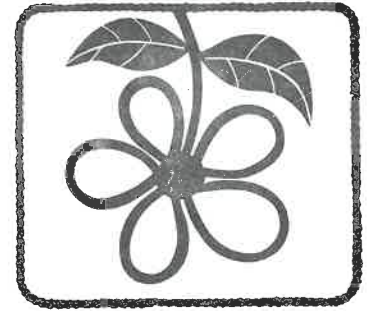

CYCLING RULES OF THE ROAD

Whatever your age, if you ride a bike in Glenview you **MUST** have a tail reflector. If you ride after dark, you **MUST** have working lights on your bike. You must also have your bike registered with the Glenview police. That costs only 25¢, and you get a registration tag, so that in case your bike is ever stolen you can get it back.

Ride a bike the same way you drive a car: **RIDE WITH TRAFFIC. KEEP TO THE RIGHT OF THE ROAD**, as close to the curb as possible. **OBEY ALL TRAFFIC LIGHTS AND SIGNS. ONE PERSON TO A BICYCLE. USE HAND SIGNALS** for left and right turns (left arm straight out for left, straight up for right). **RIDE SINGLE FILE** if in the company of other cyclists.

Watch out for doors of parked cars suddenly opened in your path, and for sewer grates and other pavement hazards. **YOUR BODY IS COMPLETELY UNPROTECTED ON THE ROAD.** Remember that in case of accident your chance of injury is very great. Be careful!
