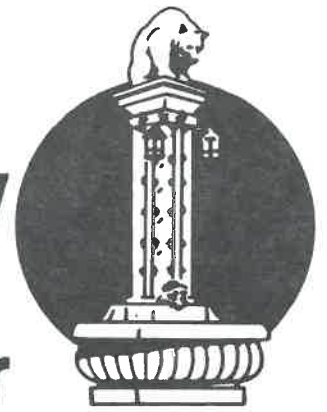

HAPPY HALLOWEEN



Village President Thomas E. Smith and Police Chief William P. Bartlett announce that Glenview's official Trick-or-Treat Night is Wednesday, October 31, from 4 to 8 PM. Parents are asked to have children strictly observe the time frame.

Households prepared to give out treats should turn on outdoor lights and secure

pets during these four hours. Please give children only **WRAPPED** (preferably sealed) food items.

If you are a parent whose children will be going from door to door, please make sure they understand and observe the following rules:

- Clothing should be warm enough for weather conditions, and safe for walking comfortably without danger of falling. Masks are dangerous because they interfere with vision. Use face paints instead. If costumes are of a dark color, attach strips of reflective tape so motorists can see children crossing streets.
- Equip each child with a treat bag and a flashlight. Never allow candles inside pumpkins.
- Children should go only to the front doors of houses that are lighted and where residents are known to them. Children should never go inside any building. They should not eat anything along the way, but should bring everything home for parents' inspection before eating.
- Very young children should be accompanied by an adult, or at least an older, responsible child.
- Children should follow the same safety rules as when going to school, crossing streets only at intersections, and paying attention to oncoming traffic.

GRAT (Glenview Radio Alert Team) and the Jaycees will be on duty the night of October 31, helping police patrol the streets.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS ARE INVITED to the Park District Halloween Dance in the east gym at Springman Junior High School, October 31, 7:30 - 9:30 PM. Pay only 25¢ if wearing a costume, otherwise 75¢.

THEFT-GUARD UPDATE

Your house is 28 times less likely to be burglarized if you are a participant in Glenview's THEFT-GUARD program.

During the seven years since THEFT-GUARD's inception, it has protected 709 Glenview residences. Since 1972 there have been only two burglaries in these THEFT-GUARDED houses, and the stolen property from one was recovered and returned, because it was readily identifiable.

In the 8,636 unprotected Glenview houses there have been 733 burglaries (8.5%), compared to only 0.3% of the protected houses.

THEFT-GUARD is a system of marking all valuables with the owner's driver's license number, using a scribing tool furnished, free upon request, by the Glenview Police Department. The police also give you stickers for the windows or doors of your house, warning possible burglars that the contents of the house have been THEFT-GUARDED.

Chief Bartlett of our Police Department says it is obvious that the stickers are a powerful deterrent. After all, the burglar knows that if everything of value is permanently inscribed, no "fence" is going to give him a very good price for the merchandise. The burglar will pass up your house and take his risks at one that is not THEFT-GUARDED.

OVERNIGHT PARKING BAN

From December 1 of this year through March 31 of 1980 (the snow season) overnight parking (2 AM to 6 AM) will be prohibited on Glenview streets, to enable snow plows to clear the roadways.

This on-street parking ban will continue each year in the future.

The only vehicles granted exception to the new law are those of nonresident visitors who obtain temporary permission to park on the street from the Police Department, and those of a handful of residents with neither garages nor driveways, who must display special stickers on windshields. (Stickers for such residents are free, and obtainable every year during November at the Village Hall.)

DURING THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER
THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES

- Approved a ban on overnight parking (December 1 through March 31, annually), except for certain vehicles with special free permits from the Village Hall. (Please see Page 1, Column 2.)
- Approved new annual fee schedule for Village vehicle stickers that allows discounts for early purchase. Under the new schedule, stickers for cars of 35 horsepower or less cost \$10 between May 1 and June 30, \$12.50 between July 1 and July 31, and \$15 on and after August 1. Stickers for cars over 35 horsepower cost \$20 between May 1 and June 30, \$25 between July 1 and July 31, and \$30 on and after August 1.
- Instructed the Village staff to investigate both the bid system and the municipal system of garbage collection and report back at earliest convenience.
- Heard the report of a special committee on marijuana possession, and decided not to pass a local ordinance that would make possession of small amounts a misdemeanor. (Police will continue to enforce the State law, which requires court cases for persons found in possession of any amount.)
- Approved lease-purchase of Basic Four Corporation of Oak Brook computer system equipment (to replace more costly system now in use) for \$98,235.
- Approved an agreement with consultants A. E. Klawitter & Associates of Glenview for nonexclusive perpetual license (\$6,500) to use the Municipal Budgetary Accounting Software Package for internal data processing, plus (at \$30 an hour) such services as assistance, personnel training, design, programming and debugging.
- Amended hours of Classes A and B liquor licenses to allow holders to serve alcohol beginning at 10:30 AM on 8 designated Sundays (for brunch guests being bused to football games).
- Prohibited parking on the north side of Golf Road from the east curb of Waukegan Road for 300 feet east, and on both sides of Waukegan Road from the north curb of Golf Road for 300 feet north.
- Approved stop signs on Cedarwood Lane at Fir St. and at Linden Leaf Drive, and on Linden Leaf Dr. at Roosevelt Avenue.
- Amended the Official Map on the west side of Landwehr Road south of Pynsky, to show unincorporated Pleasant Plains Subdivision R-1, not R-4.
- Approved annexation agreements for 75 lots at 3230 Winnetka, one lot at 2820 Old Willow, and 11 acres at 4151 West Lake (4 of the last to be acquired by the Park District for The Grove, and 7 to be rezoned by the Village for office and research.
- Annexed these surrounded areas: 14 lots on Longmeadow Dr. north and south of East Lake Ave., 21 lots between Woodlawn Ave. and Kenilworth Ln. south and west of Pleasant Ridge School, and 32 acres adjacent to The Grove, off Milwaukee Avenue.
- Annexed single lots at 1825 Balmoral and 1807 Wagner Road.
- Approved Pleasant Ridge Subdivision, 10 lots at 1450 Glenwood Avenue.
- Approved Ronald V. Norene for financial consultant and his proposed timetable for bond sales (October 1 through November 5) for the express wa-

• Approved 10 additional licenses for the American Taxi Co. to serve public convenience and necessity

FORMER VILLAGE PRESIDENT Edward K. Patten has been appointed to the Fire and Police Commission to replace Former Village President Paul H. Thomas. New Commission chairman is W. A. (Bud) Boynton.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS APPROVED our application for the Step One sanitary sewer infiltration and inflow study (\$96,000) to be conducted by Harza & Associates, consulting engineers, and granted us \$72,600 (75% of the total amount). Harza expects to have flow-measuring devices in place in selected manholes in time for this fall's rainy season. Step One is scheduled for completion by April of 1980.

LIBRARY NEEDS LOGO

The Glenview Public Library will be 50 years old next year, and in all those years has never had an official logo for its stationery, reports, announcements and posters. Library Board president Charles Davis, who is also chairman of the 50th Anniversary Committee, announces that the Library is now sponsoring a logo contest. Artwork entries should be submitted to Head Librarian Peter Bury at the Library on or before December 31. Winning logo will be announced in March of 1980.

Winner of the logo contest will receive a current edition of the World Book Encyclopedia, and the runnerup gets an atlas.

FIRE DEPARTMENT TO MARK HYDRANTS

A permanent metal post, topped with a six-inch fluorescent metal disk, will be installed beside (or somewhere very near) each water hydrant in Glenview, to help firefighters locate the hydrant without wasting precious minutes, even when there is deep snow on the ground.

Fire Department personnel are now planning the installations and will begin placing the markers in the business district and near schools, churches, other places of assembly, and around multi-family dwellings. This part of the job should be completed before the first heavy snows of this winter.

The next phase will be to install the markers in single-family neighborhoods, and such work will progress as rapidly as possible with funds available. It is hoped that all markers will be in place by the autumn of 1982.

If a post cannot be installed directly beside the hydrant (as will be the case in some places in the business district), the disk will be put on the nearest public signpost and tell exactly how many feet in which direction to find the hydrant.

Fire Department personnel are checking each marker location with all utility companies and our own Public Works and Water Departments, so that no underground facilities will be damaged.

PLEASE DO NOT RAKE LEAVES INTO THE STREET!

Please note that our street sweeper is able to handle only leaves from parkway trees that normally fall onto the street. All other leaves must be bagged and placed at the curb no earlier than 7 PM on the night before garbage collection.

Another reminder: IT IS AGAINST THE LAW IN GLENVIEW to put garbage containers on parkways, sidewalks or roadways, because it is inconsistent with Glenview's high standards. Your neighbors will appreciate your cooperation in obeying the law and keeping Glenview both safe and beautiful.

YOU ARE NOT ENCOURAGED TO PATRONIZE telephone or in-person solicitors trying to sell tickets for circuses, magic shows, fairs, or anything else that supposedly benefits police officers, or "ads" in "police" magazines or program books. Glenview police officers DO NOT belong to the Combined Counties Police Association, the Police Benevolent and Protective Society, or ANY OTHER POLICE ASSOCIATION, and DO NOT MAKE SOLICITATIONS of any kind, sell tickets or advertising, or receive money from any person, business or organization. [Don't argue with the caller; simply say, "No, thank you," and end the conversation.]

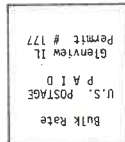

PROTECTING GLENVIEW'S CHILDREN



Francis Aldrich is the School Crossing Guard at Shermer and Central, protecting children by stopping traffic, when necessary, to let them cross the street safely.

Crossing Guards are employees of the Police Department, not the schools, and perform a valuable service to the community. There is no way that Glenview could afford to have police officers on duty four or five hours a day, five days a week, for this work. There are more school intersections in the Village than there are police officers on any one shift. Please respect the authority of School Crossing Guards who do this excellent work in Glenview.

Aldrich, a retired businessman who has been a Guard for four years, says, "I like both the work and the money." (Crossing Guards are paid \$4.25 per hour for an average duty of four hours per school day, yielding an average weekly salary of \$85.) Not only retirees, but mothers of school children like the work and find the extra money a great help to the family budget.
