## FORMER PRESIDENT DEDICATES NEW STREET



Crebert Burnham (second from left), Glenview Village President from 1929 to 1933, recently dedicated Burnham Court, a new Village street running south from Glenview Road, just west of Gladish Lane. Others in the above photo, left to right, are: Trustee Richard Hibbard, the Reverend Peter Buss, pastor of Immanuel Church of the New Jerusalem (which dedicated the road), and Trustee Robert Kustra.

Mr. Burnham, who now lives in Pennsylvania, is the son of Hugh L. Burnham, Glenview's first President, and a nephew of Daniel Burnham, the famous Chicago architect. He served as Village Trustee for four years prior to his presidency, and was later a member of both the Plan Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals.

## PRIOR SALE OF PARKING PERMITS TO RESIDENTS

Residents of Glenview may purchase 1980 Commuter Plaza parking permits *before* they go on sale to the general public. Dates for the prior sale to residents only: *Monday, November 26, through Friday, November 30, 9 AM to 5 PM.* Price for the annual ticket is \$60.

*GARBAGE PICKUPS for Thursday customers of Best, Brooks, Browning-Ferris and Weidner will be on Monday only during Thanksgiving week. Once-a-week Thursday customers of these companies will be serviced the following Monday. Customers of other firms should experience no interruption in service.*

## OVERNIGHT PARKING ON STREET IS ILLEGAL!

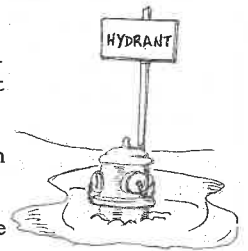
Between December 1 and March 31 (the snow season) OVERNIGHT PARKING ON GLENVIEW STREETS IS ILLEGAL. Cars parked on the street between 2 AM and 6 AM will be ticketed and the owners fined.

The reason for the ban on street parking is simple: Village equipment must clear the streets of snow, and parked cars make the job impossible.

The only vehicles granted exception to the law are those of nonresident visitors who obtain prior temporary permission from the Police Department, and those of a handful of residents with neither garages nor driveways. (Stickers for such residents are free, and may be obtained during November at the Village Hall.)

*It is also illegal to plow or shovel snow onto any public sidewalk or street, or to pile snow so as to obstruct a motorist's view. DO NOT PLOW SNOW FROM YOUR DRIVEWAY ACROSS THE STREET, LEAVING A MOUND OF SNOW ON THE EDGE OF THE PAVEMENT. DO NOT ALLOW YOUR SNOW-REMOVAL HELP TO DO THIS EITHER. Leaving snow from your property on public property is both illegal and dangerous, and the law applies to residences as well as businesses. Please inform your snow-removal help and make sure the law is obeyed.*

Finally, shovel out the hydrant if there is one adjacent to your property. The Fire Department is now installing permanent posts, but it will take 3 years to get around to every hydrant in town. Identifying yours with a temporary marker (in case it does not already have its permanent one) could save your life in case of fire.

## THIS IS BURGLARY SEASON!

Burglars are ecstatic, rubbing their gloved hands in anticipation of collecting valuable property (yours) from now until spring, while days are short and nights are long, when some of you are away on winter vacations, and when holiday spirits run high.

The way to foil thieves is to follow these police recommendations for burglary prevention:

- THEFT-GUARD your house. Call the Police Department (729-5000) and ask for the loan of the THEFT-GUARD equipment to mark your valuables.
- Whenever you leave your house, put both interior and exterior lights on a timer system, so they will go on and off automatically, giving the house a "lived-in" appearance. *Don't set the timers on the exact hour or half-hour mark* - have lights go on and off at odd times and different times in different parts of the house.
- Leave a radio playing, tuned to a 24-hour station and set loud enough to be heard by anyone entering the house.
- Close and LOCK all doors and windows.
- Disconnect electric garage-door opener.
- Lock all cars left in the garage or on the driveway, and *take the keys with you.*
- If you are going to be gone for 24 hours or more, come to the Police Administration Building, 1215 Waukegan Road, in advance of your trip and fill out a House Watch form. The beat officer will then keep an eye out for any unusual activity around your house and property.

## TURKEY WARNING

When preparing turkey, it's important to take certain precautions, according to our Health Department, because poultry can contain salmonella bacteria.

Thaw frozen turkey according to directions printed on the wrapper, either in the refrigerator or at room temperature while double-wrapped in brown paper for no longer than one hour per pound. Thawing can also be done in a microwave oven, if you have the proper directions.

Don't stuff the turkey until just before roasting. Warm stuffing harbors rapid growth of bacteria. Cook to an internal temperature (for both stuffing and meat) of at least 165°F.

After dinner, don't let meat and dressing remain at room temperature for long. Refrigerate as soon as possible. To serve over again, heat quickly to at least 165°F.

## MEET SCHOOL CROSSING GUARD AL BABBITT



Al Babbitt, the Police Department's capable morning-afternoon School Crossing Guard at the Church Street and Glenview Road intersection, has been a Crossing Guard for nine years.

He is a retired factory supervisor, having worked 40 years for Stewart-Warner in Chicago.

Al and his wife Florence moved to Glenview eleven years ago. The parents of two grown children, they both have part-time jobs and enjoy their work. They have no grandchildren — "Only the adopted ones I help across the street," says Al jovially.

School Crossing Guards are paid \$4.25 per hour for an average duty of four hours per school day, receiving an average weekly salary of \$85. Not only retirees like Al, but mothers of school children like the work and find the extra money a great help to the family budget. There are no openings at present, but if you are interested, call the Police Department, 729-5000, and ask to have your name added to the waiting list. You will be called for an interview when the need arises.

## TRANSPORTATION REMINDER

NORTRAN ROUTE 220 operates between Glenview and O'Hare Airport, stopping at O'Hare's lower-level terminals. The fare is 60¢, or 70¢ with RTA transfer (EXACT FARE REQUIRED — driver makes no change).

Route 220 operates Monday through Friday at 30-minute intervals during rush hours (AM and PM) and hourly at midday. On Saturdays, buses operate hourly all day.

## DURING THE MONTH OF OCTOBER THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES . . . .

- Approved asking State and Federal approval for two-lane improvement of both Harlem Avenue and Central Road throughout the Village: 30-foot wide pavement, curbs, gutters, and painted bicycle lanes next to curb in each direction, left-turn bays at principal intersections, and traffic signals where traffic and accident patterns warrant.
- Approved the 1979 bond ordinance (\$5.7 million) for the express water-transmission main project, at a net interest rate of 6.61%.
- Confirmed the sale of 1979 general obligation bonds to low bidder, Harris Trust & Savings and Associates.
- Awarded construction contracts for the water-transmission project (to take Lake Michigan water from the west boundary of Wilmette to our present well-water customers), as follows: to Abbott Contractors, Inc. (\$2,776,760) for the east-side transmission main; to William A. Randolph, Inc. (\$551,843) for improvements to pumping stations; to Di Paolo Company and Rosetti Construction Company — joint venture ((\$1,579,308) — for west-side transmission mains. (Total project cost is \$4,907,911.)
- Approved participation in a General Motors energy-assessment study (with Evanston, Highland Park, Northfield, Skokie, Wilmette and Winnetka), at a cost not to exceed \$3,500.
- Approved participation in a cable television study by the Northwest Municipal Conference, at a cost not to exceed \$1,500 (cost to be recovered if and when a franchise is awarded).
- Approved an addition to the 1980 budget for a paved path on Steffens Lane between Woodlawn and Huckleberry, for improved pedestrian access to Cole Park.
- Annexed 78 lots at 3230 Winnetka Road and rezoned the property I-2 (for industrial use).
- Annexed 1 lot at 2820 Old Willow Road, one lot at 3841 Chester, and 1 lot at 4151 West Lake, approving them as subdivisions, and rezoning them I-1 (for industrial use).
- Approved a one-lot subdivision at 3140 Glenview Road, in the unincorporated area.
- Prohibited parking on the east side of Church Street north of Glenview Road between 9 AM and 5 PM, Monday through Friday, and on the west side of Washington Street between Henley and Linneman between 8 and 10 AM, Monday through Friday.
- Rejected (as too high) the only bid received for the Swainwood street-lighting project.

*The U.S. Department of Energy suggests that, to save both energy and water, you install a flow restrictor in your shower. ### HAS YOUR CAR BEEN "WINTERIZED"?

Glenview Police Chief William P. Bartlett reminds you that a SAFE CAR is essential to safe winter driving. When you have yours "winterized," make sure the service includes these things:

- TIRES - Make sure they are in good condition, with plenty of tread. (Snow tires are always better than regular tires, if you can afford them for winter.) Keep tires inflated to the pressure indicated on the tire. *Low pressure does NOT give better traction, but it does wear your tires out faster, according to the experts.*
- BRAKES - You need equal braking on all wheels to avoid skidding on slippery roads.
- WINDSHIELD - You need washer jets that are in good working order, winter washer fluid, and NEW wiper blades to give you peak efficiency in winter driving.
- EXHAUST SYSTEM - Carbon monoxide is a killer, so have your system checked to make sure no exhaust fumes are getting inside the car. If the underside or rear end of your car have been damaged in any way since last winter, have them checked and repaired if necessary. Your life could depend upon that.

**WINTER DRIVING REMINDER:** Always wait until your windshield and windows are completely free of snow, frost and interior condensation BEFORE DRIVING YOUR CAR. Never put a car in motion until you can see clearly in ALL DIRECTIONS. You can hit what you can't see.

**HOW TO SAVE ELECTRICITY BEFORE IT COMES TO YOU:** The Federal Energy Administration points out that during late afternoon and early evening hours the load on the nation's electrical systems usually reaches its peak. To meet the heavy demand, electric utilities often use backup generating equipment that is not energy efficient. ● Try to use energy-intensive appliances (dishwashers, clothes washers and dryers, and electric ovens) in the early morning or late evening hours, when possible, to help reduce that peakload. ● If everyone scheduled household chores during offpeak hours, the daily fuel use of the utilities would be reduced, and the nation's energy would be conserved.
