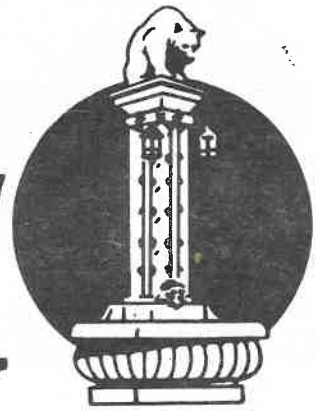

PLANS FOR THE NEW GLENVIEW VILLAGE HALL



Above is the exterior perspective drawing (as seen from the southwest) of the proposed new Glenview Village Hall, which is planned for the property on the east side of Waukegan Road immediately north of the present Police Administration complex. The police buildings are shown at right of drawing.

Architects are O'Donnell Wicklund Pigozzi of Northbrook, who were engaged by the Village Board in November of 1976 to make a preliminary feasibility study for the new building. Schematic plans were developed after a long series of consultations with

a committee of Village Hall employees.

These preliminary plans have now been completed, and were formally submitted to the Village Board on June 19, when the Trustees authorized the Village President to sign a contract for preparation of design plans and specifications. (There will be no increase in the property-tax rate, due to expiration of two other bond issues.)

The old Village Hall (built in 1929) will be operated by the Park District as a community center.

MORE COMMUTER PARKING AVAILABLE AUGUST 1

Additional commuter-parking spaces, now under construction at the northeast corner of Grove and Depot Streets, will be available for use August 1.

Residents on the waiting list have already been notified and are expected to accept approximately two thirds of the spaces. The rest are still available, on a first-come-first-served basis, at \$10 for the two months of August and September.

If you are interested in one of the new parking spaces, please apply *immediately* at the Village Hall, with your check for \$10. Decals will be mailed to successful applicants during the last week in July.

TALKS CONCERN HARLEM, CENTRAL IMPROVEMENTS

Alternative schemes for the improvement of Harlem Avenue from Glenview Road south to a point north of Golf Road, and of Central Road from Harlem to Huber Lane, are the subjects for informal meetings with residents this month.

The first round, concerning Central Road, was held July 5. The second, concerning Harlem Avenue, will be held Wednesday, July 12, when a consulting engineer and a Village representative will be on hand in the east gym of Springman Junior High from 3 to 5 PM, and again from 7 to 9 PM.

These are *NOT* Public Hearings, which will come later, after courses of action have been planned.

FREE IMMUNIZATION FOR CHILDREN

The Glenview and Morton Grove Health Departments are co-sponsoring a Children's Immunization Clinic on Saturday, August 12, at the Playdium, 1776 Glenview Road, from 10 AM to noon.

Children from two months to 18 years of age may receive free immunizations against measles, rubella, polio, whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus, provided they are IN GOOD HEALTH AND WITHOUT ALLERGIES OR ASTHMA, and also provided they are ACCOMPANIED BY A PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN.

Immunization records, if available, should be brought along with the child. No appointments are necessary.

POLICE CHIEF WARNS OF SOLICITORS

Phone solicitors selling tickets to magic shows or circuses are NOT Glenview Police Officers, warns Glenview Chief William P. Bartlett, nor does the Glenview Police Department benefit in any way from the sale of such tickets.

Likewise, in-person solicitors trying to sell ads to local merchants for "police magazines" have no connection whatever with the Glenview Police Department.

The sales schemes are money-raisers for unions to which NONE OF OUR POLICE OFFICERS belong. Chief Bartlett advises you not to be misled by these solicitors, who may tell you something else.

Classes are sponsored by the Secretary of State to help those whose licenses are expiring.

HEALTH AND EXERCISE FOR SENIORS

SHAPE, which stands for Senior Health Action Program of Evanston, presents an eight-week free health series for older people, from 1:30 to 3 PM Thursdays, beginning July 13 at the Glenview Community Church, 1000 Elm Street.

Advance registration is necessary - call the Health Department (724-1700) or SHAPE (475-0917).

The series, co-sponsored by the Glenview Health Department and the Senior Citizens Club, will consist of discussions (led by a Registered Nurse) and periods of modified Yoga exercise (led by a qualified instructor). Discussions will center on arthritis, hypertension, heart problems, proper use of medicines, nutrition, and accident prevention.

HOMEMAKER SERVICE AVAILABLE TO NORTH SUBURBAN ELDERLY

The North Suburban Homemaker Service, a division of Cook County Child and Family Services, is located in Evanston and serves Glenview.

Services include light housework, shopping, escort and errands, simple personal care, and meal preparation. For more extensive care, the service has a contractual agreement with the Visiting Nurses Association.

Emotional and spiritual uplift are important elements of the program, which enables elderly persons with minor physical problems to remain in their own homes and lead independent lives far longer than would otherwise be possible.

DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES

- Authorized the Village President to sign a contract for the preparation of building plans and specifications for the new Village Hall (see story on Page 1). Due to the fact that bond issues for the Fire Station and the Library Parking Lot are both being retired, the bond issue for the new Village Hall will require *no increase* in property taxes. The cost will be \$1.5 million, approximately half of which is already on hand, earmarked for the purpose. (The present Village Hall will be turned over to the Park District for use as a community center.)
- Heard the final report of the temporary Commission on Senior Citizen Housing (now dissolved), recommending that: 1) The Village Board create a special commission to facilitate, implement and oversee development of Village, Township, County, State and Federal resources and existing facilities and resources to aid senior citizens in housing and the development and maintenance of a desirable quality of life for older people. 2) The Village Board appoint a special committee to investigate, prepare and submit a specific plan for construction and/or redevelopment of senior-citizen housing, seeking cooperation between private and public sectors. 3) The Village Board establish an appropriate budget and Village Staff support for the work of the above groups.
- Endorsed the draft of the water-quality management plan prepared by the Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission, provided it is revised annually with Village participation, and that this endorsement does not constitute Village acceptance of recommended responsibilities as a designated management agency. (Glenview supports the alternative 208 Water Quality Management Structure set forth by the League of Women Voters, the Barrington Area Council of Governments, and the Metropolitan Housing and Planning Council, doing away with the county-committee structure proposed by NIPC, and designating local governments within the drainage basin for pollution control.)
- Approved an agreement with the Chicago and Northwestern Transportation Company to install a water main under the West Lake Avenue railroad tracks to connect our two well-water systems.
- Denied annexation for 15 acres at the northwest corner of Central and Dearlove for a development of 435 units, which is too dense for Glenview and must be reduced to no more than 270 units before further consideration.
- Approved a proposal of Harland Bartholomew and Associates to seek a grant from Argonne National Laboratories for an energy-efficiency study benefiting the Village of Glenview.
- Leased part of the Milwaukee Road property on the east side of Lehigh Avenue south of the Lake Avenue overpass for free commuter parking for 50 cars displaying Glenview Village stickers.
- Awarded a contract (\$232,429.10) to Monarch Asphalt for repaving of Village streets, as detailed in the June NEWSLETTER.
- Agreed to buy (for \$145,000) 3 acres at 1313 Shermer Road, north of Lake Avenue, for gradual development as a Public Works Service Center.
- Annexed the remainder (approximately 62 acres) of The Grove, on Milwaukee Avenue south of Lake.

SUPER-TRASH! THE RECYCLING CENTER NEEDS IT - THE LANDFILLS COULD DO WITHOUT IT!

Please bring the following kinds of trash to the Recycling Center (1237 Waukegan Road) instead of putting them out for the garbage man:

- Steel cans
- Glass - clear, green or brown
- Aluminum - cans and TV dinner trays
- Newspapers (no magazines or other paper products, please)

The Recycling Center is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and *needs* your super-trash - all money from the sale of the above materials goes directly to the support of the Youth Services of Glenview.

The landfills (where your garbage eventually goes to rest) are rapidly filling up, and will close down before too long. When that happens, new landfill sites will have to be found. They will be farther away from Glenview, and the cost of trucking the garbage a longer distance will rise, meaning that garbage rates will increase. We can all help to prolong the lives of nearby landfills by recycling as much of our super-trash as is possible.

A THUMBNAIL SKETCH OF THE POLICE PENSION BOARD

Glenview's Police Pension Board is responsible for certifying newly-hired police officers as participants in the pension fund, administering the investment of the fund's monies (accrued from police personnel salaries, direct tax levy, Village Corporate Fund, citizen contributions, and interest earned on investments), and establishing eligibility for retirement and disability pensions.

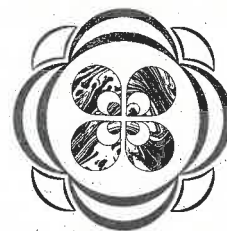
There are five board members. Two are appointed by the Village President and confirmed by Trustees, and the other three are elected by police personnel.

Current appointed members are Joseph Martorano (who is the chairperson) and I. Michael Wolinski. The elected members are Police Lt. Fred Grabo (ret.), Police Officer Richard Lapinski and Police Sgt. Harry Stander.

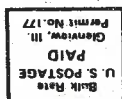
