

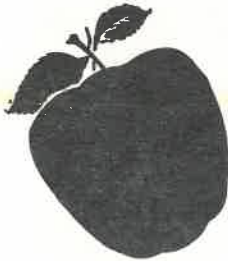

CAUTION: CHILDREN AT WORK



SCHOOL is back in session, which means that Glenview children are traveling to or from school at various times every week day.

Police Chief William P. Bartlett reminds motorists of this State law:

YOU MUST COME TO A FULL STOP FOR LOADING AND UNLOADING OF SCHOOL BUSES, and not resume driving until the bus cancels its STOP signal and goes on its way. You are required to observe the bus-stop regulation whether you are facing the bus or following it. Persons violating this law are subject to stiff penalty.

In addition to exercising care in the presence of school buses, please drive slowly through school zones, all of which are clearly posted.

Parents of pedestrian students should remember that the safety of their children depends upon use of established routes, as designated by the school. Streets should be crossed ONLY AT DESIGNATED INTERSECTIONS — those that are equipped with traffic signals or adequately patrolled.

Remember that darkness comes earlier now that it is fall. Please warn your children to take extra care at dusk.

A WORD OF CAUTION FOR THOSE LEAVING TOWN

If you are moving away from Glenview soon, please call the Village Hall (724-1700) and ask to speak to someone about your water account.

This procedure is important, because a delinquent account causes a great deal of trouble further down the line.

IMPORTANT HOUSEHOLD HINT

The State Department of Public Health warns of the danger of unprotected outdoor faucets or basement laundry tubs to which hoses are connected). New construction in Glenview is now required to have devices known as vacuum breakers, to protect against "back flow," because it is possible to siphon contaminated water back from a hose into the water system — a potential health hazard.

If, for example, you were filling your swimming pool with a hose during the time when water pressure was lowered (due to a fire, a water-main break or some other reason), pool water could be siphoned back through the house system into the water main, polluting not only your water supply, but that of your neighbors as well.

While our Building Department has no control over anything but new construction, it advises you to equip all hose connections with vacuum breakers as a safety measure. Ask your plumber for vacuum breakers for all your hose connections. Install them yourself, merely by screwing them onto the hose bibs. The devices cost only \$6.75 plus tax.

 FIRE PENSION BOARD**

The Glenview Fire Pension Board is responsible for certifying newly-hired firefighters as participants in the pension fund, administering the investment of the fund's monies (accrued from fire personnel salaries, direct tax levy, Village Corporate Fund, foreign fire-insurance tax, citizen contributions, and interest earned on investments), and establishing eligibility for retirement and disability pensions.

There are 8 board members, 5 specified by State statute and 3 elected by fire personnel. The statutory members are Village President Thomas E. Smith (chairman), Village Attorney Zachary D. Ford (secretary), Village Manager Robert H. van Deusen (treasurer) Fire Chief Kenneth Wood and Village Clerk Carol C. Heffernan. Elected members (for 3-year terms ending in 1980) are Fire Lieutenant Philip Guzzetta, Fire Captain James A. Prims and Firefighter-Paramedic Thomas J. Dettloff.

MOSQUITO ABATEMENT FOR UNPROTECTED AREAS

Petitions must be circulated in order to place on a ballot the proposition to have the following areas annexed to the North Shore Mosquito Abatement District for protection next year:

Everything between Harlem and Washington south of Central, in Maine Township, and everything west of Pflugsten in Northfield Township.

Fifty-one percent of registered voters in these two areas must sign petitions before the matter can be placed on a ballot, and barely half that number have signed so far.

DURING JULY AND AUGUST
THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES ...

- Passed the annual appropriation ordinance (\$9,471,955) for the fiscal year 1978-79.
- Passed the annual tax-levy ordinance for 1978 (\$2,192,256 for Village and Library purposes).
- Approved sale of a one-time-only vehicle sticker for half price, to cover the period from November 15, 1978, to June 30, 1979, putting Glenview on a new yearly schedule of July 1 - June 30 in the future.
- Adopted the State Code regarding size, weight and load of motor vehicles, and regarding driving while intoxicated.
- Amended the zoning ordinance regarding heights of buildings, by adding the word "residential" to language describing surrounding areas.
- Approved Pebble Creek Subdivision, 90 townhouse units at 1500 Waukegan Road.
- Approved Forster's Subdivision, 5 lots of one-third acre each, at 3055 Willow Road.
- Granted a variation for a curb walk on the east side of Spruce between Linne-man and Robin Crest.
- Annexed the following properties: 3340 West Lake Avenue (zoning it for industrial use); 1100 Castillian Court (on Milwaukee Avenue north of Glenview Road); 1879 Chestnut (one lot now in industrial use).
- Prohibited parking on Glenview Road between Harlem and the Library driveway, for a bus stop.
- Objected to consideration to move AMTRAK trains from the Milwaukee Road to the North Western tracks, which would eliminate Glenview's AMTRAK service.
- Denied game rooms (commercial establishments selling only the use of electronic amusement devices) as a permitted use in Glenview.
- Objected to a planned-unit development for an unincorporated one-acre plot on Central Road east of Cobblestone Court.
- Declined to pass legislation regulating window signs in commercial establishments.
- Accepted the bid of Fields AMC Jeeps, Inc., for 3 vehicles for \$16,855.14, with trade-ins. (Jeeps are for Public Works Department use.)
- Accepted a bid of \$5,510.55 from Able Fire and Safety Equipment Company of Chicago for a Hurst Rescue Tool for Fire Department use.
- Accepted the bid of W. Wanzenberg & Co. of Schiller Park (\$6,810) for purchase and installation of a pump control and pressure-reducing valve.

DUTCH ELM DISEASE STILL WITH US

The Public Works Department removes diseased parkway elms promptly, in an effort to halt the spread of Dutch Elm Disease. So far, residents have been most cooperative in reporting sick elms and removing dying trees from private property within 30 days of detection of the blight, as required by law.

Please continue to keep a close watch of your privately-owned elms. If one of them begins to look unusual, please call Public Works (724-1700) and ask for a member of the staff to make an examination.

COOK COUNTY HAS AWARDED a contract to McDermott Construction Company (\$3½ million) for grade separation at the railroad crossing on Lake Avenue east of Pfingsten Road. Work is expected to begin about the second week in October.

●
THE FIRM OF CONSOER, TOWNSEND & Associates has been authorized to design water-system improvements necessary to bring lake water to Glenview residents and others now being served by our two well-water systems. The project should be completed by May 31, 1980.

●
THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION has approved the addition of West Lake, Chestnut, and Greenwood between East and West Lake, to the Federal Aid Urban System, making it possible to use 70% Federal, 15% State and 15% local funds for future improvements. (The asphalt resurfacing to be done this year is not part of the FAUS program.)

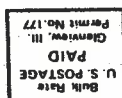
