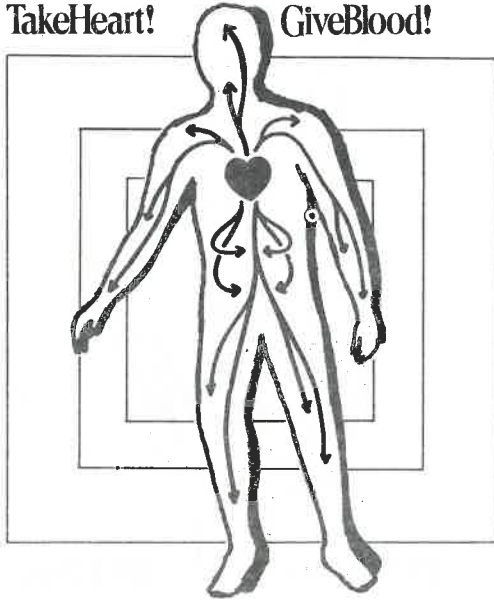

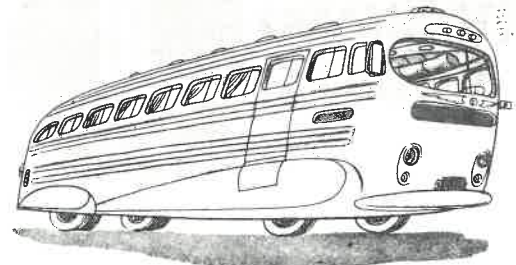
THE VILLAGE HALL WILL BE OPEN TWO SATURDAYS — FEBRUARY 5 AND FEBRUARY 12, 9 AM TO NOON, TO ENABLE YOU TO BUY 1977 VEHICLE STICKERS. THE DEADLINE FOR DISPLAYING THEM ON YOUR CARS IS MIDNIGHT TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 15.

OUR FIRST BLOOD DRAWING of the new year will be held on Tuesday, January 11, from 3 to 8 PM at the Fire Station, 1815 Glenview Road.

Blood supplies are low at this time of year, as donor levels went down during the final holiday weeks of 1976. And blood is urgently needed, as many people who needed surgery put it off until ~~after~~ the holidays.

Start the new year by giving generously toward our 1,200-unit quota for 1977.

GLENVIEW'S RECYCLING CENTER (at the rear of the Youth Center at 1237 Waukegan Road) is ALWAYS open for your convenience.



If you need help with unloading, there are young people on duty there between 3 and 5 PM every weekday, between 8:30 AM and 5 PM on Saturdays, and between 10 AM and 1 PM on Sundays.

If you visit the Recycling Center when no one is on duty, please put your materials in the marked bins adjacent to the driveway.

Acceptable materials include bundled mixed paper, glass (please separate clear, green and brown and remove metal rings), and metal cans. It is very much appreciated when you cut off ends of cans and smash cans flat, because many more pounds of metal can be carried on a truck when cans are flattened.

All the money earned by sale of recyclable materials goes to support the Recycling Center and the Youth Center. Thanks for your help in this important effort!

THE NATIONAL FIRE PROTECTION ASSOCIATION finds that there is less danger of radiation from smoke detectors than from television sets or from normal daily exposure to the sun. Under fire conditions tests show that radiation is negligible. Charles Morgan, president of the national group, urges homeowners with ionization detectors to leave them in place. "Smoke detectors save lives," he states. If you do not already have one in your home, shop for one soon — the cost is infinitesimal as compared to the loss of a loved one. (Be sure to look for the UL or comparable label before buying — no point in installing a safety device that is itself not safe.)

## TWO VACANCIES ON LIBRARY BOARD TO BE FILLED

Two vacancies for Library Board Directors will be filled at the April 19 Election. If you are interested in appearing on the ballot to be elected to a six-year term as Library Director, you must submit a petition carrying signatures of at least fifty Glenview residents, no later than February 14.

The vacancies will occur because two incumbent Directors, Board President Glennard R. Lucas and Mary Graham, have declared they will not seek reelection.

Notarized petitions for appearance on the ballot must be filed with the Village Clerk at the Village Hall.

**THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES . . . . .**

- Abated the tax levy for general obligation bonds issued last fall for water and sewer improvements. (Interest and principle will be paid by the Water and Sewer fund.)
- Approved the decision of the Architect Selection Committee to have O'Donnell Wicklund Pigozzi, Inc., of Northbrook make a preliminary study for a new Village Hall.
- Established four Class G liquor licenses (for package-liquor sales subsidiary to food and drug operations), and reduced Class C licenses (for package-liquor sales only) to three.
- Granted a Class B liquor license to Howard Johnson's Ground Round restaurant.
- Approved final plat for Big Oaks Subdivision, at the southeast corner of Waukegan and Winnetka Roads (seven acres) for 79 townhouse units. The address is 1661 Winnetka Road.
- Annexed 1828 Wagner Road, 1778 Jefferson, nine lots on Kenilworth and Balmoral, and Carol Estates (on Glenview Road west of Revere).
- Annexed 30 acres at the southeast corner of Willow and Pfingsten Roads (2625-2729 Pfingsten), zoning the north half for a shopping center and the south half for single-family homes.
- Accepted an easement (from School District 30) for a storm sewer to serve the 30-acre annexed parcel at Willow and Pfingsten.
- Amended the license portion of the Village Code to include two new classifications, one for research and development firms and one for corporate headquarters, licenses to be calculated at \$35 plus \$1 per employee, with a maximum charge of \$400.
- Denied a petition to rezone 1215 Pine Street for multiple-family dwellings.
- Amended the Traffic Code to provide for stops on Long Road at Wilmette Avenue and at Virginia Lane and Michael Manor.
- Adopted procedural resolutions to meet federal and state grant program requirements for improvement of property at the northeast corner of Grove and Depot Streets as a commuter parking lot.
- Established regulations for the new Library parking lot: the south portion for employees only, the rest for public parking for two-hour limits between 7 AM and 5 PM, no limits between 5 and 11 PM, closed at 11 PM.
- Accepted the bid of Wilshore Motors of Wilmette for seven 1977 Police Department vehicles (\$24,397), and one 1977 Building Department vehicle (\$3,891).

- Awarded a contract (\$36,029.50) to Corie Construction of Hanover Park for a new water main on Waukegan Road from Glenwood to Chestnut.
- Removed the Historical Society property from the fire limits, and amended the fire limits to allow a frame addition to the Historical Society building, in keeping with the existing architectural design.
- At the Township's request, increased semi-annual user charges by \$1, to property owners on the Northfield Township sewer line (west of the Chicago and North Western freight tracks), to cover increased operating costs of the system.
- Authorized an agreement with the Village of Niles, whereby Niles will provide Fire Department dispatch services for Glenview (as well as for Glenbrook, Morton Grove and Maine Fire Districts), beginning about March 1. The new system is being instituted to prevent delays and duplications in fire service as well as to save money for all concerned.
- Appointed Ralph Synnestvedt, Jr., to the Appearance Commission for a term ending May 31, 1978.



THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT wishes to thank those who have called in to report water-main breaks. Prompt handling of these situations saves

water and prevents ice buildups that could cause traffic accidents. If you should see water leaking over the pavement, please do help us by calling. During business hours calls to Public Works should be made to the Village Hall (724-1700). After 5 PM and on weekends, calls for Public Works are taken by the Police Department at 729-5000. (As a footnote to the large number of water-main breaks so far this winter: last summer's abnormally dry weather caused soil conditions leading to more breaks than usual with the arrival of freezing weather. In one 30-day period our Public Works crews repaired 24 breaks — four of them during a single weekend.)

THANKS, ALSO, to those of you who observed our snow-parking regulations — Public Works appreciates your cooperation in not parking on the street when a snowfall of two inches or more is forecast. Crews begin plowing at 3 or 4 AM in order to have streets clear in time for the morning rush. Cars parked on the street make the job very tough for them and the results unsatisfactory — for both people using the streets and people who get plowed in.

REMINDER: Don't shovel snow into the street or onto a public sidewalk, or pile it so high that it obstructs the view of an intersection. Thanks for your continued cooperation in keeping our streets clear and safe. (Don't forget to shovel out around the fire hydrant — that could save your life!)
