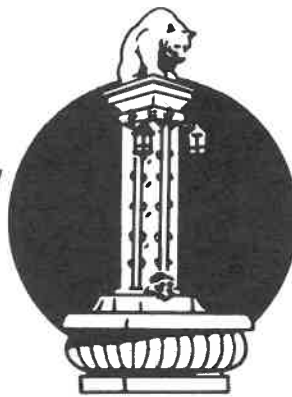

GENERAL VILLAGE ELECTION

Tuesday, April 19

Polls will be open from 6 AM to 6 PM on Tuesday, April 19, for the general Village Election. Please watch for a list of polling places and a map of voting districts in your local newspapers. The information will be published well in advance of election day.

Offices to be filled are VILLAGE PRESIDENT (4-year term), three VILLAGE TRUSTEES (4-year terms), VILLAGE CLERK (4-year term), and two LIBRARY DIRECTORS (6-year terms).

ELECTION JUDGES ARE NEEDED to work on election day! If you are a registered voter and willing to serve, please call the Village Hall, 724-1700, as soon as possible.

IF YOU ARE 18 YEARS OLD OR MORE AND NOT REGISTERED: you have until Friday, March 18, to register at the Village Hall during regular office hours. Please call 724-1700 if you have any questions.

OPENINGS FOR POLICE OFFICERS, CADETS

The Police Department is now taking applications for the position of Police Officer. Starting salary is \$1,153 per month, with regular increases to \$1,473. Liberal fringe benefits include paid vacations, sick leave, paid holidays, uniform allowance, comprehensive health insurance and pension fund. Applicants must be between 21 and 34 and hold high-school diplomas. Applications are at the Police Administration Building, 1215 Waukegan Road, and must be returned before midnight on March 19. Glenview is an equal opportunity employer.

The Police Department also has openings now for Police Cadets, high-school graduates between 17½ and 20, who would be interested in training with the Department. If you are interested, you may apply to Deputy Chief Robert Pfeister at the Police Administration Building by March 19.

GLENBROOK HOSPITAL OPENS SOON

No exact date has yet been announced for the opening of the new Glenbrook Hospital at 2100 Pfingsten Road in Glenview, but a hospital spokesperson says it will be "soon."

The new hospital is owned by Evanston Hospital and has its own board of directors, medical staff and auxiliary. Patient-care facilities include 144 medical/surgical beds, 8 intensive-care and coronary-care beds, and 5 operating rooms where major and minor surgery can be performed.

A full-service emergency department will be staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, by physicians specializing in emergency medicine and Registered Nurses trained in trauma nursing. Glenbrook patients will also have access to specialized patient-care service at Evanston Hospital, such as the burn unit.

Glenbrook Hospital is affiliated with Northwestern University's medical school and McGaw Medical Center.

NORTRAN BUS SERVICE EXPANDED

#212 now goes to Northbrook Court, runs 6 days a week

THE NORTRAN #212 BUS ROUTE has now been expanded to include Northbrook Court. Buses run approximately every hour, including Saturdays, and will stop on demand. BASEMENT FLOODING

What is being done by the Village:

The Village recognizes that basement flooding is more than just an inconvenience. It is a positive hazard to afflicted homeowners.

The Village now inspects all storm and sanitary sewer systems (using video equipment in problem areas) on a regular schedule. In addition to regular maintenance, including repair and replacement of faulty sections, a water-jet cleaning system is now being used to keep our sanitary sewers clear of obstructions.

The east Glenview Road section is currently being relieved of its flooding problems by a new sewer costing \$385,000 — a temporary inconvenience to area residents, but a cure for the basement-flooding problems once it is completed.

Strict enforcement of our downspout disconnection ordinance has helped during major rains. New homes are now required to separate sanitary wastes from roof and ground run-off, further reducing overloads on sanitary sewers. Building Department enforcement of the plumbing code has helped eliminate many problems also.

Suitable water-retention facilities are now required for new construction covering more than ten acres, reducing the effect upon existing sewer systems. Erosion control ordinances enforced in the flood-plain area help to prevent flooding where river overflow has been a problem in the past.

Construction of the Techny Flood Control project, designed to stop river flooding and ease storm-sewer backup and sanitary sewer infiltration, is expected to start this spring. Glenview's share is \$450,000 toward the engineering and design.

What you can do for yourself:

Consult a reputable plumber or sewerage contractor, to make sure there isn't something fairly routine that can be done to correct your basement flooding problem. A variety of things cause flooding, and an expert can give you a pretty good idea of what is causing yours.

Disconnect your electrical appliances when they are not in use. Label your circuit-breaker switches, making emergency shut-downs easier. Locate and label gas shut-off valves BEFORE an emergency arises.

NEVER ENTER A FLOODED BASEMENT UNTIL WATER HAS RECEDED. NEVER USE WET ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES. OR COME IN CONTACT WITH WET CIRCUITS. IF FLOODING HAS EXTINGUISHED PILOT LIGHTS ON GAS FURNACES AND WATER HEATERS, REMEMBER THAT AN EXPLOSION IS POSSIBLE AND TAKE PROPER PRECAUTIONS.

Cleaning should be started as soon as the water recedes. Use rubber gloves, protective clothing, strong detergents and disinfectants to protect yourself against health hazards. →

EXPLORING SPAIN: THE KNOWN AND UNKNOWN is the subject of a slide presentation by DeNux LeBlanc at the Library on Wednesday, March 9, 7:30 PM, in the Maynard Room. LeBlanc is a former geography professor, now a visual-aids expert, and is an experienced traveler and lecturer. Admission is free.

ARCHAEOLOGY IN SOUTHERN ILLINOIS, a slide presentation showing the historical richness of artifacts (some pre-dating the Egyptian pyramids) now being unearthed near Kampsville, Illinois, will be shown on Friday, March 11, 7:30 PM in the Library's Maynard Room. Dr. Irwin Rosner, one of the field directors of the Northwestern University archaeological program, is the speaker. Admission is free.

THE METRIC SYSTEM is the subject of a program slated for Thursday, April 14, 7:30 PM in the Library's Maynard Room. Lynn Bredemeyer of the University of Illinois Cooperative Extension Service, will use slides in showing how to adapt our daily activities to the use of the metric system. Admission is free.

During the months of January and February

THE GLENVIEW BOARD OF TRUSTEES ...

- Accepted the special committee's report regarding renewal of insurance coverage (\$112,348) for 1977, covering both Village property and Village personnel.
- Rezoned property at 1828 Wagner Road (from R-1 to R-3) and Carol Estates, south side of Glenview Road west of Revere (R-1 to R-4), and accepted plats of both single-family subdivisions.
- Vacated part of the river easement at the rear of 1739-49 Grove Street, so that the property can be sold with a clear title.
- Referred to the Plan Commission a proposal to define "drive-in restaurant" and to amend the zoning ordinance.
- Approved an \$8,000 settlement for possible storm-sewer damage to a garage at 1245 Pine Street, subject to an easement grant and garage rebuilding.
- Approved Glenview's share (\$2,814) of the NORTRAN bus system's current budget.
- Authorized Northbrook to act as our agent in executing a maintenance contract (\$5,065 for the first year, and the same amount plus cost-of-living escalators for subsequent years) for our share of NORCOM police communications. (The system involves Glenview and 12 other north suburban municipalities.)
- Accepted public improvements in Triebold Subdivision Number 3.
- Accepted amendments to an annexation agreement with owners of property at the southeast corner of Willow and Pflingsten Roads, involving a right-of-way change (from 66 to 60 feet) and a walk easement connecting the property to Fox Run Subdivision.
- Approved conditional use of a well site near the southeast corner of Willow and Pflingsten Roads.
- Renewed our agreement with the State, whereby we will maintain State route roadways within Village limits.
- Accepted the addition of 811 Railroad Avenue to Glenview Subdivision.
- Accepted an agreement with O'Donnell Wicklund Pigozzi, Inc., for a first schematic design phase for a new Village Hall.
- Annexed one lot at 950 Kings Lane.
- Appointed Sherwin Braun chairman of the Appearance Commission.
- Approved conditional uses of B-1 and B-2 (business classifications) in the depot area (east of the railroad tracks and adjacent to the Milwaukee commuter station), which is zoned for light industry.

BLOOD IS ALWAYS IN SHORT SUPPLY. To maintain our 1,200-unit blood quota to meet all your possible needs for blood replacement this year, Glenview Blood Central has set up five more blood drawings: March 8, May 10, July 12, September 13, and November 8 (all Tuesdays). The mobile blood-drawing equipment will be at the Fire Station from 3 to 8 PM on those dates. If you will call Blood Central at 724-1700, you will be reminded of the next drawing. If you are willing to donate blood at any other time, please call North Suburban Blood Center, at 1500 Shermer Road, Northbrook, 498-9840, and make an appointment. Donors should be between 17 and 65 and in good health.

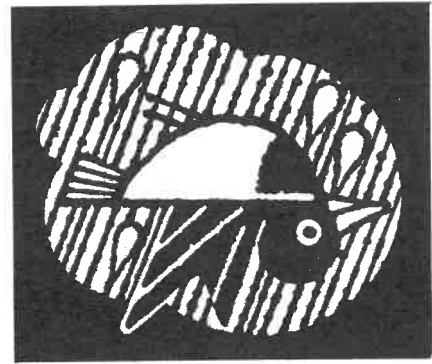
RAT POISON IS BEING USED in rodent-infested areas on a regular schedule. It is placed directly inside burrows and also in metal bait stations on runway areas. The poison used is Warfarin - extremely toxic if ingested. One of the bait stations was recently stolen from the Miller Drive retention pond. No questions will be asked if the missing station is returned, either to the pond from which it was taken or to the Health Department, second floor of the Village Hall.

IF YOU HAVE CHILDREN 18 OR YOUNGER, please review their immunization records - especially for measles. The Cook County Health Department gives ALL immunizations for children 18 and younger (not just for measles) FREE OF CHARGE on the third Thursday of each month, 9 to 11 AM, at Trinity Lutheran Church, southwest corner of Algonquin and Wolf Roads, in Des Plaines. If you have children over 18 living at home, please consult your family physician. If you have questions, please call the Glenview Health Department (724-1700) or the Cook County Health Department (298-5800).

- Amended the Village ordinance to restrict open parking of certain boats and trailers to rear and side yards only, in residential areas; amended the definition of "open off-street parking" to mean any parking space where the vehicle is not enclosed by both walls and roof.
- Increased licensed waste disposal contractors by one, to include Glenbrook Disposal Service, Box 106, Glenview (724-8409).
- Prohibited parking on part of the north side of Cedar Court.
- Authorized advertisement of the offer to sell a one-foot strip of real estate east of the Fire Station.
- Approved an agreement with Donald Manhard Associates for engineering services for part of Wagner Road.
- Requested State closure of Glenview Road on July 2 for a Street Sale.

GLENVIEW OBJECTED to two rezoning requests (11 unincorporated acres on the south side of West Lake Avenue west of Landwehr Road from low-density single-family to higher-density classification, and 9.3 acres at 3640 Lake Avenue in Wilmette from commercial to community retail use, for multiple-family dwellings). The Cook County Board denied the former and the Wilmette Special Zoning Committee recommended that Wilmette deny the latter.

TENTH ANNUAL CIVIC AWARDS NIGHT ANNOUNCED

Glenview's tenth annual Civic Awards Night dinner will be held on Thursday, May 5, at the North Shore Country Club. The event is sponsored each year by the service clubs - Rotary, Lions, Kiwanis, Optimists, and the Chamber of Commerce. Four presentations will be made:

- THE PUBLIC SAFETY AWARD - to a police officer or firefighter who has performed an *outstanding act or service in line of duty*.
