HOT, HUMID AND SUNNY DAYS unfortunately produce high ozone levels in metropolitan areas like ours, where there is a great deal of carbon monoxide in the air.

Peak periods on high ozone level days are between 11 AM and 6 PM.

If you have trouble breathing in such weather, consult your doctor.

The State's emergency plan consists of four stages: Watch, Yellow Alert, Red Alert and Emergency. When any of these is in effect (radio and television announcements will let you know), you should STAY INDOORS, preferably in an air-conditioned building.

During an alert you should refrain from driving, physical activity and smoking. During an Emergency Alert, the only vehicles that are supposed to be on the road are emergency vehicles.

THE FINAL TABULATION of the April 19 Village General Election vote showed that 3,984 ballots were cast, representing 22.4% of the 17,774 registered Glenview voters.

DRIVE YOUR BIKE EXPERTLY ...

Your life depends upon it



Driving your bike according to the rules is important if you want to stay alive and have a healthy body.

You notice we say DRIVING your bike, not riding it, because as a cyclist you must obey all traffic regulations — signs, signals and street markings — exactly as if you are driving a car.

Most adults who cycle already know how to drive a car, but bike-riding can be great training for kids, who will be car drivers some day and can get a real head start on safe-driving techniques.

When driving your bike, use hand signals to indicate turning and stopping. Make sure your bike is equipped with reflectors and lights. Ride WITH the traffic, never against it.

If you are riding with others, keep in a SINGLE FILE. Watch out for drain grates, soft shoulders and other road-surface hazards, car doors opening or cars pulling away from the curb.

NEVER HITCH RIDES on other vehicles. Be extremely careful at intersections, doubly so when making left turns.

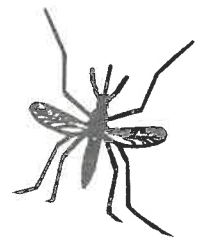
Ride DEFENSIVELY (meaning look out for the other guy).

REGISTER YOUR BICYCLE at the Police Department, 1215 Waukegan Road. Bike registration is a free service of the Glenview Police, to help you recover the bike in case it is ever stolen.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR BIKE. Lock it up wherever you leave it, even at home. Have it inspected at regular intervals to make sure it is always in safe mechanical condition. (When you are riding it, your life depends upon its being in perfect working condition.)

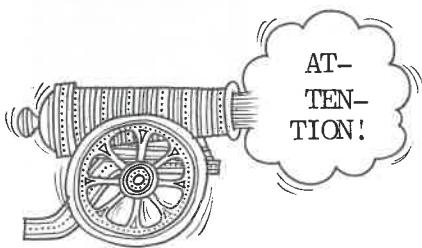
IF YOU'RE THE PARENT of a fledgling cyclist, pick up a copy of Bicycle Rules of the Road at the Police Department. It's free. Go over it carefully with your child to make sure he or she is prepared for the hazards involved.

YOU WILL BREED MOSQUITOES if there are places around your house where water collects. Some mosquitoes lay eggs in water, others in dry places where water will collect later. In water, eggs hatch in a day or two. In dry places they hatch whenever water collects enough to cover them — which could be months after they were laid. DISCARD any receptacle that can hold water. CLEAN OUT rain gutters, even though you did it last fall, because more debris has now collected from trees coming into leaf and bloom. CHANGE BIRD-BATH WATER twice weekly, and change pet-watering pans every day.



During the month of May
the GLENVIEW TRUSTEES ...

- Entered into our annual agreement with the State for Village maintenance of certain State roadways within the Village, with reimbursement by the State.
- Appointed Robert W. Kustra of 325 Washington Street to fill the unexpired term of Richard Hibbard on the Plan Commission, until July 31 of 1978. (Mr. Hibbard was elected Village Trustee on April 5.) Mr. Kustra is professor of Political Science at Loyola.
- Authorized inclusion of Belwood Lane east of Greenwood in the proposed annexation referendum.
- Defined tow-away zones, and established a specific tow-away zone on Pleasant Lane east of Waukegan Road (700 feet on the north curb, south curb and median) between 10 PM and 4 AM.
- Awarded a contract to Amedeo Ritacca of Highland Park (\$26,087.50) for water-main improvements on Wagner Road north of Kenilworth Avenue and south of Kings Lane.
- Awarded a contract (\$9,760 maximum) to the engineering firm of Schumacher and Svoboda for design of a new commuter parking lot at the northeast corner of Grove and Depot.
- Approved Big Oak Subdivision (southeast corner of Waukegan and Winnetka Roads) documents and easements.
- Approved conditional use of 1129 Depot Street for serving meals on Friday and Saturday nights between 8 and 12 for no more than 20 guests (by reservation only), as part of a cooking school operation.
- Amended planned-unit development at Willow and Pfingsten Roads to modify the east wall and the parking-lot layout.
- Rezoned 1722-28 Chestnut to RT-8 (medium-density single-family) classification.



THE VILLAGE HALL WILL BE CLOSED on Monday, July 4, for the Independence Day holiday.

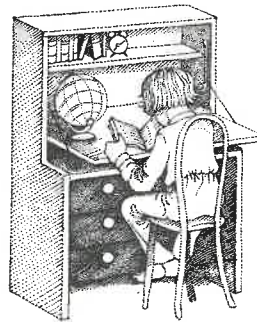

If your dog gets lost and picked up by the police, you will be notified and can have an instant reunion.
