HELP TO REDUCE AIRCRAFT NOISE

The Illinois Pollution Control Board is conducting a series of public hearings, beginning Friday, July 8, on an amendment proposed by the Attorney General's Office, to regulate noise levels for commercial aircraft.

If adopted, the amendment would affect noise levels for O'Hare, and therefore over Glenview.

Village President Thomas Smith testified for the amendment on June 17, and the Pollution Control Board now needs testimony from residents severely affected by aircraft noise.

HOUSEHOLD WASTE IS COLLECTED AT YOUR DOOR, not at the curb, where waste containers make an unpleasant sight for your neighbors. YARD DEBRIS should be placed at the curb, IN DISPOSABLE CONTAINERS, no earlier than 7 PM the evening before pickup. Please observe the rules to preserve the beauty of our Village.



HERBS AND HERB GARDENS will be the subject on Sunday, September 11, 2 PM, at the Glenview Historical Society, 1121 Waukegan Road, presented by herb expert Martha Zocchi of Maywood, curator of the famous herb garden at Triton College. BLOOD DRAWING JULY 12

Because the need for blood replacement is great during the summer months, you are urged to make a blood donation on Tuesday, July 12, at the Fire Station (1815 Glenview Road) between 3 and 7:30 PM.

If you are between 17 and 65 and in good health, please call Glenview Blood Central at 724-1700 and make an advance appointment.

Your donation helps to keep Glenview's blood-assurance program - unlimited blood replacement for ALL residents - in effect. Those covered in the community program include the resident, spouse, minor dependent children, and children to age 25 who may be temporarily non-resident, besides blood-dependent (unable to give because of age or medical reasons) parents and in-laws plus grandparents and in-laws, anywhere in the U.S. at the time of the transfusion. In return for these benefits, blood donations representing only 4% of our population (1200 units) are required annually.

HOME FIRE ALARMS

Home fire alarms are now within the reach of every family, at a reasonable cost of \$25 to \$30. There are two types: ionization (available in either battery-powered or plug-in units) and photoelectric (available only for wiring or plugging in). The ionization type is most sensitive to gases, while the photoelectric unit responds to smoke particles. Make sure whatever unit you buy bears the seal of a reputable testing laboratory, such as UL. You may need more than one unit, and may want to purchase one of each type. If you're in any doubt as to what to buy and where to put it (or them), don't hesitate to call the Fire Prevention Bureau at 724-2141.

If you already have a home fire alarm, remember that it needs maintenance. Clean the air intakes two or three times a year with a vacuum cleaner, as dust can interfere with the unit's performance.

Fire alarms also need testing on a regular schedule. Test your battery-operated unit when you return from vacation to make sure the cells are still good. Warning signals to tell you that the power is going are designed to last only for 7 days, so your unit may have been beeping to an empty house while you were away.

If your wired-in detector has a test button, pressing it will tell you only that the electrical circuit is active, not that your unit is still operational. To test it properly, feed some smoke directly into it and see whether the alarm goes off.

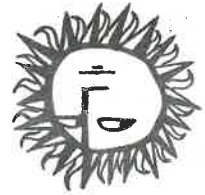

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES ...

- Agreed to purchase the Illinois Municipal Water Company's Glenview System (\$1,425,000) and the Northfield Woods Water and Utility Company (\$2,200,000 plus water-main connection fees of \$350 for each new dwelling unit for the next 15 years), sometime during the week of August 29. (The purchase will have no effect whatsoever upon our present customers.)
- Authorized financial consultants Paul D. Speer & Associates to open bond bids for the two water systems at 1 PM July 18 at the Speer office.
- Obtained an injunction to halt construction of 276 dwelling units on 15 acres on the east side of Milwaukee Avenue north of Glenview Road, because the development was proceeding contrary to a court-approved plan.
- Approved application for use of Motor Fuel Tax funds for storm-sewer extensions on Lindenleaf Drive north of Glenview Road and on Fontana Drive west of Bel-Air Lane.
- Approved an agreement with the Milwaukee Road permitting interconnection between grade-crossing warning devices and new traffic signals at Glenview Road and Harlem Avenue.
- Approved a petition to the Circuit Court of Cook County to hold an August annexation referendum for Glenview Estates, Belwood Subdivision and other properties.
- Approved making the Spruce Drive - Elm Court intersection a 4-way stop.
- Rezoned 4 and 6 Park Drive, vacant parcels belonging to Immanuel Church of the New Jerusalem, from R-4 to R-18 (both residential classifications).
- Approved conditional use of property at 1604-24 Waukegan Road for outdoor parking of rental vehicles.
- Approved a 2-lot subdivision at 1037 Woodland Drive, and one-lot resubdivisions at 950 Pleasant Lane and 1913 Waukegan Road.
- Approved Chestnut Gardens Subdivision at 1904 Chestnut for townhouse development.
- Reappointed: Zachard D. Ford Village Attorney until April 30, 1978, Sherwin Braun (chairman) and A. Arnold Anderson to the Appearance Commission (Braun to May 31, 1980 and Anderson to May 31, 1979). Appointed Royce Masterson to the Appearance Commission until May 31 of 1978.
- Officially congratulated the Park District on its 50th anniversary.

How to

NEVER HAVE A TRAFFIC ACCIDENT!

Al Rinaldo, a NORTRAN bus driver who holds a National Safety Council award for operating a bus for 22 years without ever being involved in a traffic accident, has the formula for safe driving. And he should know, having covered a million miles behind the wheel of a bus -- which is a lot harder to drive than a passenger car.

Here are the secrets:

- BE ALERT. Check your mirrors and keep an eye out for erratic driving by others. Always keep both hands on the wheel. Avoid sudden stops, which can cause rear-end accidents.
- ANTICIPATE THE HAZARDS. Expect the ball rolling into the street to be followed by a running child, and the car at the curb to open the door. If exhaust smoke is coming from a parked car, expect it to pull away from the curb.
- KNOW YOUR VEHICLE'S LIMITATIONS. Judge carefully about speed, road conditions and clearances, and never take a chance or a guess.
- RESPECT OTHERS. Don't cut off other drivers or vie with them at intersections. Don't threaten or hurry either drivers or pedestrians.

Driving is a dangerous game and the stakes are very high. So every time you start your car, tell yourself that you're now going into the game, and going in to win. (Winning means not having an accident.)

NEW INFORMATION ABOUT TRAFFIC OFFENSES and Driver's Licenses

The Illinois Supreme Court has increased minimum cash bail for traffic offenses from \$25 to \$35, as of July 1. Bond certificates have increased accordingly, to cover the new amount.

Drivers without bail-bond cards would be wise to carry \$35 in cash at all times if they do not want to surrender their driver's licenses.

Some speeding offenses are pre-payable (\$35 or \$50), but exceeding the limit by 30 miles or more requires a court appearance and posting of a \$100 cash bond or license surrender.

Bail for driving under the influence of liquor or drugs has been increased to \$2,000 (\$200 cash, or \$100 cash and your driver's license). Bail for driving with a suspended or revoked license is now \$1,000 (\$100 cash).

Photo Driver's Licenses, and Photo Identification Cards for non-drivers, are now available. Inquire at the Secretary of State's offices (on Elston Avenue in Chicago, or on Milwaukee Avenue in Libertyville) if you are interested.

PLEASE NOTE: Later this month a new driver-testing facility will open at Deerbrook Mall on Waukegan Road between Northbrook and Deerfield.
