If you're not completely won over while offering your donation, you surely will be when you have refreshments afterward, served by the vivacious Junior Women's Club volunteers who so kindly staff Glenview Blood Central drawings.

If you will make a blood donation at the Fire Station on September 13, please call Glenview Blood Central at 724-1700 for an appointment. To be eligible to donate blood you should be in good health, between 17 and 65 years old, and weigh more than 110 pounds. (And be able to fall in love.)

50-50 PARKWAY TREE PROGRAM

Applications accepted until October 7

You have a chance to choose one or two new trees — from 7 different varieties — for the parkway adjacent to your property. The 2½-in. balled-and-burlapped trees will be planted by the nursery contractor under supervision of the Public Works Department, and you will receive a 1-year guarantee for each tree. (The Public Works Department reserves the right to reject unsuitable locations for new trees.)

If you wish to order (please note that there is a LIMIT OF TWO TREES PER ADDRESS), please complete the form below and return it to the Village Hall no later than Friday, October 7.

Planting will be done in late October or early November, after the first frost. If you have questions, call Public Works, 724-1700, or visit the Public Works Department office on the second floor of the Village Hall.

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES . . .

- Adopted the appropriation ordinance for the fiscal year 1977-78, totalling \$8,980,993.
- Adopted the 1977 tax levy, totalling \$2,810,700.
- Approved the issuance of \$4,525,000 in general obligation bonds for the purchase and improvement of the Illinois Municipal Water System and the Northfield Woods Water and Utility System, bonds to be paid off by earnings from sales of water. Bonds were sold on August 9 for net interest of 5.04%. (Moody's Investors Service has improved Glenview's bond rating from A1 to AA.)
- Adopted new water and sewer rates *affecting only customers of the newly-acquired well-water systems*, to take effect October 30. Water rates: \$1.15 per thousand gallons for Village residents and \$1.45 per thousand gallons for non-residents. Sewer service charges for residents: 10¢ per thousand gallons, plus — for those served by the Northfield Township outfall sewer (formerly operated by Thomas & Associates) — an additional Township surcharge of \$2.50 per quarter. *Exception:* Sewer-service charges do not apply to residents served by the Combined Developers System (which is maintained by the Township).
- Employed Best Environmental Consultants to assist us in obtaining an additional lake-water allocation.
- Accepted as a gift the Domicile Manor retirement complex, to be built between East and West Lake Avenue east of Pfingsten, and to be conveyed to the Village after amortization of tax-exempt bonds issued by the developer.
- Authorized \$120,000 of local Motor Fuel Tax funds for street improvements: Linneman between Elm and Harlem, and Lincoln between Linneman and Larkdale (four blocks).
- Annexed 106 acres (1900 Chestnut), zoning it for 192 dwelling units, one 60-acre park, and 20 acres of light industry.
- Approved self-service gasoline sales, provided customers observe the rules: NO SMOKING and ENGINES TURNED OFF DURING FUELING.
- Agreed to enforce traffic regulations on two private roadways (Valley Lo Lane and Valley Lo Court).
- Authorized a four-way stop at Balmoral Avenue and King's Lane, and a stop sign on Kenilworth at East Ridgewood.
- Authorized purchase of a portable radio, a telemetry repeater, and defibrillation equipment (\$13,907), for the Mobile Intensive Care Unit. (Equipment formerly used in the MICU will now go into the Fire Department's station wagon, giving Glenview two vehicles capable of handling cardiac emergencies.)
- Authorized purchase of equipment: for servicing the new water systems, one rubber-tired backhoe, two one-ton dump trucks, and 1 small van (\$46,774.65); replacements for Public Works Department use, two new 2½-ton trucks (\$18,914) and two new Cherokee jeeps (\$10,444).
- Authorized purchase of an A. B. Dick offset press (\$2,744.23) for the Village print shop, which handles printing of all Village materials.
- Accepted the parkway-tree bid of Berthold Nursery of Elk Grove Village. (Estimated value of trees to be contracted for: \$19,780.)

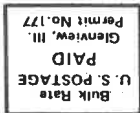

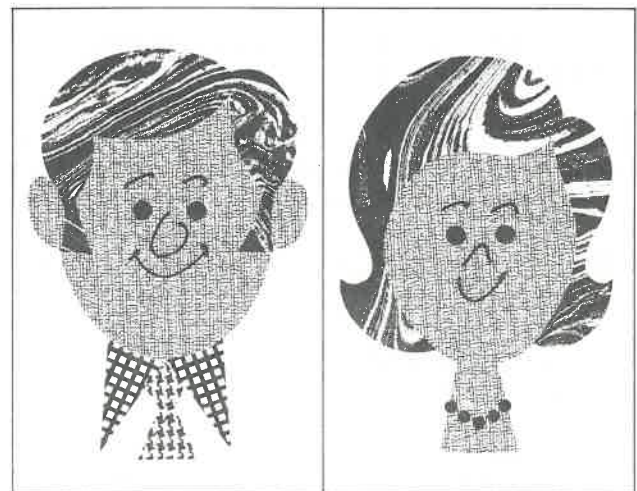
- Issued one new pouring license, for a proposed restaurant at 973 Waukegan Road.

THE BOARD HAS DECLARED A TEMPORARY MORATORIUM on new service connections to well-water systems until an agreement can be negotiated with Allstate for an emergency water connection.

THERE ARE STILL A FEW KEEPSAKE PACKAGES of Bicentennial Books left at the Village Hall. Packages of three books each are only \$5, so get them while they last. Your children and grandchildren will treasure them in times to come.

FREE SENIOR-CITIZEN DRIVER TRAINING begins again on Monday, September 12, from 1 to 3 PM, at the Park District Golf Club, 800 Shermer Road. The second session will follow on Monday, September 19. ADVANCE REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED. Call either of the instructors: Ralph Ulrich (729-5782) or John Schnell (724-3378). The classes are sponsored by the Secretary of State to help those whose licenses are expiring soon.

IT IS NOT THE END OF THE MOSQUITO SEASON. During September the Culex mosquito changes its feeding habits and begins to bite human beings. You should therefore continue to discourage breeding. Remove containers that can collect even small amounts of water. Change the water in bird baths and wading pools weekly. If you are doing that and still have a mosquito problem, please call the North Shore Mosquito Abatement District at 446-4230.

WILMETTE, FROM WHICH GLENVIEW BUYS WATER, now charges a wholesale water rate (retroactive to March 1 of 1976) of 39¢ per 100 cubic feet, up from 27.6¢ — a 41% increase. The new rate prevails until March 1 of 1979, at which time it will be recalculated under the contract formula. It is the equivalent of 52¢ per 1000 gallons.

NOW IS THE TIME to have your furnace checked by a reliable heating contractor. Brick fireplace chimneys should also be checked for necessary cleaning. The Fire Prevention Bureau reminds you that artificial logs (which are meant for FIREPLACE USE ONLY, never for use any other way) are made of wax and sawdust, burn very hot, and should be used ONE AT A TIME and NEVER POKED.
