THE CHICAGO LUNG ASSOCIATION warns that hot, humid, and sunny days produce highest ozone levels between 11 AM and 6 PM. If you have trouble breathing in such weather, consult your doctor.

The State has an emergency plan consisting of four stages: Watch, Yellow Alert, Red Alert, and Emergency. When these are in effect (you will know from announcements on radio and television) you should STAY INDOORS, in an air-conditioned building, if possible.

During an alert it is important that you refrain from physical activity and smoking, and do not drive your car. (Nothing except emergency vehicles are supposed to be on the road during an Emergency Alert.)

You probably saw an article about this in a recent issue of *Chicago Tribune*, under the byline of the paper's environment editor, Casey Bukro.

TORNADO WARNINGS ARE ANNOUNCED, during storms, by all radio and television stations. When a warning is sounded, open the windows for cross ventilation, to minimize the pressure, and go to the basement. Get under a table and keep away from windows.

If there is no basement, go to the center of the building and get into a closet or under a piece of heavy furniture. Keep away from windows, because in case a tornado hits, you could be badly injured by flying glass.

YOU WILL RAISE MOSQUITOES if there are places around your house where water collects. (Some mosquitoes lay eggs in water, others in dry places where water will collect later. In water, eggs hatch in a day or two; in dry places they hatch whenever water collects to cover them - perhaps months after they were laid.) DISCARD any receptacle that can hold water. CLEAN OUT rain gutters, even though you did it last fall (more debris has now collected from trees coming into leaf and bloom). CHANGE BIRD-BATH WATER twice weekly, pet watering pans every day.

NORTRAN BUSES now honor Milwaukee Road weekly, semi-monthly, and monthly commuter tickets for 20¢ fare reductions on routes connecting with the railroad (#'s 2, 10, and 20 in Glenview). This reduction makes your bus fare only 25¢ if you show your commuter ticket to the driver when you get on the bus.

OUR 50-50 SIDEWALK PROGRAM will be in effect again this year. Broken or hazardous public sidewalk adjacent to your property will be replaced by the Village if you pay half the cost. Take a look at the public sidewalk now to see whether it needs work. Prices and application forms will appear in an upcoming Newsletter.

YOUR PRIVATELY OWNED ELM TREES should be checked by a professional tree service NOW for signs of Dutch Elm Disease, which spreads from one tree to another.

The first noticeable symptoms are wilting, curling, or yellowing of leaves. This is followed by browning, dying of branches, or a premature leaf fall.



If you spot a suspect tree, please call the Public Works Department, 724-1700.

WARM WEATHER and picnics go together, and — unfortunately — the possibility of food poisoning goes with both.

The Health Department reminds you to keep hot foods really HOT (140° F) and cold foods really COLD (below 45° F).

PICNICKING IN THE BACK YARD can be ruined by flies and rodents. Make sure your garbage cans are in good condition and have tight-fitting lids. Pick up all pet excrement immediately to prevent flies from breeding.

HAVE YOUR BLOOD PRESSURE CHECKED, free of charge, on Tuesday, May 4, 5-7 PM, by volunteers from the Glenview Registered Nurses Association, at Immanuel Lutheran Church, 1850 Chestnut Street. The service is sponsored by the Glenview Health Department, the Heart Association of North Cook County, and Immanuel Lutheran Church. CALL GLENVIEW BLOOD CENTRAL, 724-1700, and make an appointment to donate blood on Tuesday, May 18, 3-8 PM, at the Fire Station. We need your donation if you are between 17 and 65 and in good health. As a Glenview resident you (and your entire family) are covered by our blood assurance program when you need blood transfusions — but we must meet our annual quota of donations in order to maintain this coverage!

During the month of April
THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES ...

- Approved a live-entertainment license for the Glenview Country House restaurant.
- Approved an agreement with the State, whereby the State will pay 90% (approximately \$45,000) of the cost of new traffic signals for the Harlem Avenue - Glenview Road intersection.
- Annexed Woodland Grove, 29 lots west of Pfingsten Road and south of Lake Avenue.
- Approved a 5% Utility Tax, effective May 2.
- Approved routine transfer of annual appropriations between accounts for the fiscal year ending April 30.
- Approved Triebold's Subdivision, 1301-1341 Woodlawn (6 lots on the south side of Woodlawn west of Sunset Ridge Road) for single-family homes.
- Approved Zylke Subdivision, the south side of 1929 Waukegan Road, for a parking lot.
- Approved Allen Carlson Resubdivision, 1929 Prairie Street (2 lots fronting on Prairie and Pine Streets) for townhouse development.
- Approved the Health Department's recommendation to provide mosquito control for this year for two parts of Glenview (one between Harlem and Washington south of Central, the other between Pfingsten and Landwehr) which are not yet in any mosquito-abatement district, at a cost not to exceed \$3,590. *(NOTE: There is not time for these areas to annex to mosquito-abatement districts yet this year, and because of the possibility of encephalitis, the residents must be protected. Residents of the two areas described above are urged to support annexation to a mosquito-abatement district by signing petitions when asked. The typical Glenview property owner pays only about \$2 per year in taxes for mosquito abatement - well worth the price. By spring of next year, the two areas should have completed the process of annexation to a mosquito-abatement district.)*
- Reappointed: Charles M. Boyles chairman of the Plan Commission until July 31, 1979; David H. Kearns and Robert R. Thomas to the Zoning Board of Appeals until June 30, 1980.

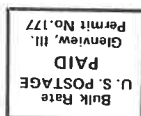
