## REGISTRATION AND VOTING INFORMATION

YOU CAN REGISTER until 5 PM Friday, September 17, at the Village Hall during regular hours (9 AM-5 PM Monday through Friday) and at A SPECIAL SATURDAY REGISTRATION on September 11, 9 AM-2 PM. Phone 724-1700 if you have any questions.

PRECINCT REGISTRATION will be held on Tuesday, October 5, at your precinct polling place between 8 AM and 9 PM. October 5 is the very last chance to register anywhere in time for the November 2 election.



YOU ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER if you are a U.S. citizen 18 years or older (or if you will be 18 on or before November 2), and if you have lived in your precinct 30 days or more.

YOU MUST RE-REGISTER if you have changed your name or moved since the last election.

If none of the above registration dates and places suit your schedule, you may also register at your Township Office through Friday, September 17:

Northfield - 1607 Waukegan, Glenview, 9 AM-5 PM Mon., Tues., Thurs., Fri., 9 AM-Noon Wed., Sat. (724-8300)

If you work in Chicago and want to register at the County Clerk's Office in the County Building, 118 N. Clark, Room 402, you can do so through Monday, September 27, 9 AM-5 PM Monday through Friday, 9 AM-Noon Saturday (443-5666).

Saturday, October 2, is the last day for persons eligible to vote only for the office of President (having recently moved here from out of state) to apply for the Presidential ballot. Call the County Clerk, 443-5666, for further information.

**ABSENTEE VOTING:** If you are registered but cannot go to your polling place to vote on November 2 (because of being out of the county, being an election judge in a precinct not your own, being too sick to go out, or being prevented from going by some religious tenet) you may:

- VOTE IN PERSON at the Cook County Clerk's Office, 118 N. Clark, Chicago, as soon as ballots are ready (about October 15, but call first - 443-5666 - to make sure, until November 1. →

## ATTENTION, OWNERS OF DIRECT-DIAL ALARMS!

If you now have a direct-dial alarm system in your home or Glenview place of business, you must file an application for connection to special lines leading to Police and Fire Departments. (See Village Board Action on next page.) Here is the procedure:

- Pick up a connection application form at the Village Hall.
- Fill out the form and return it, with a check for \$10, to the Village Hall by December 1. (The \$10 fee is a one-time-only charge.)
- You will receive your connection permit by mail.

IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO PURCHASE a direct-dial alarm system, please apply for your connection permit first, then wait for it to come through before installing the system.

GET YOUR NEW "ZEBRA" LIBRARY CARD on or before Monday, September 20. That's the day the Library goes onto the computer system. The Zebra card guarantees efficiency.

## VOTING INFORMATION (continued)

- VOTE BY MAIL by applying for an Absent Voter's Ballot from the County Clerk's Office, 118 N. Clark, Chicago IL 60602 (443-5666), not more than 30 days nor less than 5 days prior to November 2.

IF YOU ARE GOING TO VOTE IN THE NORMAL WAY, at your own precinct polling place in Glenview, check your voter registration card for the precinct (district) number, then watch local newspapers for listing of polling-place locations. (Or call the Village Hall, 724-1700.) Polls will be open from 6 AM to 6 PM.

VILLAGE BOARD ACTION  
during July and August

- Prohibited sale or possession of electronic stun guns.
- Annexed Huber Park
- Amended the zoning ordinance to permit more flexibility in spacing of buildings in planned developments.
- Passed the annual appropriation and levy ordinances. Total appropriations for fiscal year 1976-77 amount to \$5,763,454. Total tax levy for the year is \$1,949,436.
- Enacted new parking regulations on Tinkerway and Pine Court. (Please observe the posted signs. In some places there is no parking; in others, 2-hour parking is allowed.)
- Entered into a lease agreement with Youth Services of Glenview for property at 1237 Waukegan Road, instead of 1233 Waukegan Road (which is to be demolished).
- Awarded contracts to: Arrow Road Construction of Mt. Prospect (\$156,657.94) for street resurfacing and construction of a cul-de-sac on Stevens Drive; Berthold Nurseries of Elk Grove Village for 6 species of trees for the 50-50 Parkway Tree Program (*see item on next page*); Monarch Asphalt Company of Skokie (\$42,943.75) for repaving; Santucci Construction Company of Skokie (\$333,112) for water and sewer improvements; Vermeer-Illinois of Batavia (\$4,413) for a Model 630 stump cutter.
- Appointed Jeffrey M. Randall Village Prosecutor, effective August 16.
- Approved an annexation agreement with the mobile-home park at 1718 Waukegan Road.
- Transferred \$110,358.49 in old (prior to 1955) Special Assessment funds to the Corporate Fund.
- Required residents with direct-dial alarm systems to file applications for connections to special lines, and pay a one-time-only fee of \$10 each. (Direct-dial alarm systems connected to Fire and Police Department emergency numbers have caused serious problems when malfunctioning devices tie up telephone lines.) *See item on Page 1, Column 2.*
- Rezoned 1872-76 Grove Street and 1155 Depot to P-1 (public-use classification).
- Requested Northfield Township to continue sewerage service in Woodland Grove Subdivision.
- Approved Kissel Resubdivision (1325 Pleasant and 1320-1330 Kenilworth) and Hemesath's Resubdivision (1445 E. Lake Avenue - 3 lots).

COOK COUNTY COMMISSIONERS HAVE DENIED rezoning of the northwest corner of Willow and Pfingsten Roads for commercial use, and rezoning of a parcel on Jefferson west of Waukegan Road for a parking lot. (Glenview had opposed both rezonings.)

OFFICER JIM GRAY of the Police Department starts the "Officer Friendly" program in District 34 schools this month. He'll stress safety and good citizenship.



OUR NEW RECYCLING CENTER

Glenview's new Recycling Center opens on Saturday, September 11, at the rear of the Youth Center, 1237 Waukegan Road, north of the Police Administration Building. The Youth Center is operating the new recycling project and will realize the profits from sale of salvage.

The Center accepts newspapers, magazines, corrugated paper, glass, and metal cans. Newspapers and magazines must be tied securely. Corrugated materials must be flattened and tied. Glass must be rinsed clean (paper labels may be left on - no problem). Metal cans require a little more attention: remove the ends and throw them away - they can't be recycled. Then rinse the cans and flatten them. Paper labels must also be removed from cans.

Get into the recycling habit! It's easier than you think, and very important to saving the planet and its natural resources. Besides that, we are running out of places to bury garbage. The price of waste disposal would become prohibitive if we had to send our garbage into outer space!

THE NORTRAN BUS from the Naval Air Station to the Chicago Loop, formerly called Route 10, is now known as 210, and it begins and ends at Glenbrook Hospital.

It still stops at the Naval Air Station, leaving there on the hour and the half-hour during rush periods. During the rest of the day it runs every 90 minutes (every two hours on weekends).

MAKE SURE YOUR CHILD'S BIKE is checked regularly for mechanical safety, and that the rider knows the rules of the road for cyclists (RIDE WITH TRAFFIC, OBEY ALL TRAFFIC SIGNS AND SIGNALS EXACTLY AS IF DRIVING A CAR, and RIDE SINGLE FILE IF IN THE COMPANY OF OTHER CYCLISTS). Chief Bartlett of our Police Department reminds you that you may ride on the sidewalk in Glenview, provided you are courteous to pedestrians and always allow them to have the right-of-way. Riding on the sidewalk is much safer than riding in the street, because the unprotected body of a cyclist stands very little chance of survival in a traffic accident.

FREE SENIOR-CITIZEN DRIVER TRAINING begins Monday, September 13, 1-3 PM, at the Park Board Golf Club, 800 Shermer Road. A second session will be held the following Monday, September 30. ADVANCE REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED: Call either of the instructors, Ralph Ulrich (729-5782) or John Schnell (724-3378). Classes are sponsored by the Secretary of State to help those whose licenses are expiring.

VOLUNTEERS, BOTH LAY AND PROFESSIONAL, are needed for the New Jersey flu immunization program. Clinics will be held on Saturday at the Playdium and Monday at the Glenview Naval Air Station, sometime in October (watch local newspapers for the dates), from 7 AM to 7 PM. Volunteers may work either the AM or the PM shift. As several thousand people will probably take advantage of the free immunization opportunity, large numbers of volunteers are needed. Lay people will help with routing, tallying, and other paper work, and professionals will help administer the vaccine. 50-50 PARKWAY TREE PROGRAM  
Applications open until October 1

You now have an opportunity to choose one or two new trees (from 6 different varieties) for the parkway adjacent to your property. The 2½-inch, balled-and-burlapped trees will be planted by the nursery contractor under supervision of the Public Works Department, and you will receive a 1-year guarantee for each tree.

The Public Works Department reserves the right to reject unsuitable locations for new trees.

If you wish to order trees (please note that there is a limit of two trees per address), please complete the form below and return it to the Village Hall NO LATER THAN FRIDAY, OCTOBER 1.

Planting will be done in late October or early November, after the first frost. If you have questions, call Public Works, 724-1700, or visit the Public Works Department office (second floor, Village Hall) where you can see photographs of the 6 varieties of trees being offered.
