



DEADLINE FOR REGISTERING MULTIPLE-OCCUPANCY BUILDINGS

Wednesday, March 12, is the deadline for registering multiple-family dwellings situated in single-family zones. If you own such a dwelling, register it on or before March 12 to avoid action to have it converted to single-family use.

Dwellings originally designed and constructed for single-family occupancy and later converted to multiple-family occupancy (including occupancy of detached structures such as garage apartments) are affected by an ordinance adopted by the Village Board which rules that all such non-conforming uses are extended to July 1 of 1979, PROVIDED THE OWNER REGISTERS THE DWELLING ON OR BEFORE MARCH 12, 1975.

Some multi-family non-conforming buildings may have permits extended to July 1 of 1989, provided the lot size is sufficient to permit a land-area-per-dwelling unit meeting the minimum size in the zone where the dwelling is located.

Application forms for time extensions under the ruling are available from the Building and Zoning Department at the Village Hall.

- Granted a Glenview license to Gray's Livery Service, to accommodate the necessity and convenience of Glenview residents.
- Added 17 spaces to the Commuter Parking Plaza, on the east side of Railroad Avenue between Dewes Street and the alley north of Dewes.
- Requested State Highway Division approval to close Glenview Road between Harlem Avenue and Waukegan Road on July 5 for a street sale sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.
- Annexed 1301-1341 Woodlawn Avenue.
- Prohibited through traffic between Overlook Drive and the Kraftco Headquarters building entrance drive.
- Contracted with Barrington Nurseries for the spraying of 1500 parkway elms at \$2.18 per tree, and with Clarke Outdoor Spraying Company for approximately 600 gallons of methoxychlor at \$5.10 per gallon.

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THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT reminds you that you should make arrangements now, if you haven't already done so, to have your privately-owned elm trees sprayed by a professional tree service. This is to protect the valuable elms on your own property, and also to protect all elms in our area — as Dutch Elm Disease is contagious, spreading from tree to tree. Village expenditure to protect parkway trees is in vain if there is a nearby tree on private property infected with the disease.
