IS YOUR IDENTITY HIDDEN?

If you should need emergency ambulance service at your house, can our Paramedics find you in time to save your life? YOU know where your house is, but all the ambulance driver has to go on is an address — a number.

If your house number is hidden by vines or shrubs, or is indecipherable from the street, precious seconds can be lost as Paramedics try to locate the house. The law states that your premises must be numbered so that the address is CLEARLY VISIBLE FROM THE STREET. If your house is set a long way back, numbers should be either very large, or else repeated clearly on a sign nearer the roadway. The law is for your own good, in case of a health, police, or fire emergency. Please check your house numbers AT NIGHT (when most emergencies seem to occur) and FROM THE STREET, to see whether they are properly visible. If not, put up new numbers immediately, light them properly at night, or cut away whatever greenery is hiding them.

DO THIS NOW, while you're in good health. When you're having a coronary attack, it's really too late!

A RECENT FIRE IN THE GLENVIEW AREA burned a garage and a car, and was caused by spontaneous combustion in a bag of fresh grass clippings. Moist vegetable matter generates a great deal of heat, and can burst into flame igniting the plastic bag and anything flammable in the immediate vicinity. Keep grass clippings and leaves out in the open while awaiting pickup.

THIS IS THE RIGHT TIME to call your heating company and have the furnace cleaned, checked, and repaired if necessary. Don't wait until time to get the furnace going — heating companies are busy then with emergency calls.

OUR 50-50 PARKWAY TREE PROGRAM (you pay half the cost of the tree and the Village pays the other half) begins September 22, when applications will be accepted at the Village Hall. Pick up an application blank on or after that date, or call Public Works at 724-1700 and one will be mailed to you. Actual planting begins in November.

HAVE YOUR BLOOD PRESSURE CHECKED free of charge on Tuesday, September 16, 5-7 PM, at Immanuel Lutheran Church, 1850 Chestnut Street, courtesy of the Glenview Health Department, the Heart Association of North Cook County, Immanuel Lutheran Church, and volunteer nurses from the The Glenview Registered Nurses Association. No advance appointment is necessary.

REGISTRATION FOR THE LIBRARY'S Pre-School Storytime series (for youngsters 3 to 5 years old who are not enrolled in kindergarten) begins Wednesday, September 17, in the Children's Room. A Glenview Library card is required. There are three 8-week sessions, and a child should be enrolled for only one session per week, either on Tuesday or Wednesday, at 9:30 AM or 1:30 PM. Fall series runs from October 7 to December 3, winter series from January 6 to February 25, and spring series from March 9 to April 28.

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES ...

- Amended the definition of construction and demolition wastes (for which salvage companies may charge a fee for special pickup) to include earth, brick, concrete, stone, and sod.
- Reduced liquor-pouring licenses from 13 to 12, owing to the withdrawal of an application.
- Passed the annual Levy Ordinance for 1975, in the total amount of \$1,425,815.
- Adopted seven ordinances increasing liquor, motor vehicle, and business licenses, plumbing and building permit fees, and water and sewer service charges.
- Awarded contracts for selected Village roadways to Monarch Asphalt of Skokie (\$178,433) and Cutler Repaving, Inc., of Lawrence, Kansas (\$32,244), the latter for a special process involving heating, cutting, and addition of new material.
- Reappointed Stanley H. Griffin Chairman of the Building Commission until July 31 of 1979, and members Robert S. Campbell, August Tiritilli, and Arne J. Foss until July 31 of 1976, 1977, and 1978, respectively.
- Appointed Norman M. McCorkle Chairman of the Electrical Commission and Chief Electrical Inspector of Glenview, until September 30 of 1976. McCorkle holds a Master's degree in electrical engineering, is a professionally licensed engineer, and has taught engineering on the university level. A retired 28-year employee of Underwriters Laboratories and a Glenview resident for 20 years, he replaces James S. Mashl.
- Recommended that the Zoning Board of Cook County deny an application for variation of the lot line on 1.72 acres at the southeast corner of Chestnut Avenue and Riverside Court.
- Recommended rezoning of 17.5 acres on the west side of Sanders Road about a half-mile south of Willow Road, from R-3 and R-5 to B-3, for corporate headquarters use. The proposed use conforms to our Comprehensive Plan.

COOK COUNTY has denied rezoning of property at the southwest corner of Willow and Shermer Roads for multiple-family and commercial development, and of property on the west side of Milwaukee Avenue in Maine Township for a car wash, tennis, and racquet-ball club. Glenview had previously opposed both rezonings.

PLANS AND the necessary State approval for repaving Elmgate and portions of Robin Crest and Linneman west of Shermer will not be completed in time for construction work to begin this year. Residents of these streets are hereby so advised.

INTERNATIONAL NIGHTS at the Glenview Public Library begin Wednesday, September 10, 7:30 PM, Maynard Room, with an illustrated tour of Greece, Israel, and Egypt, presented by Dr. and Mrs. George P. Makas. Admission is free, and you are cordially invited to attend.
