THE GLENVIEW BOARD OF TRUSTEES ...

- Approved placement of a stop sign on Estate Lane at Rugen Road.
- Accepted the Village Manager's recommendation to use federal revenue-sharing funds to pay Glenview's share of the Metropolitan Sanitary District's engineering and administrative costs in connection with planned Techny floodwater retention basins, and to not rebate a portion of the tax levy for fire-station bonds. (The original plan had been to use federal revenue-sharing funds to retire part of the fire-station bond commitment.)
- Decided that all future Board meetings will be adjourned promptly at 11 PM to a time and place certain.
- Denied request of the Glenview Public Library to use the southwest corner of Glenview Road and Washington Street for additional library parking.
- Contracted with Arthur Weiler Nursery, Inc., of Deerfield for six varieties of trees for Glenview's cooperative (50-50 cost split between the Village and the resident) tree-planting program. Varieties are Marshall Seedless Ash (\$68), Ginkgo (\$82), American Linden (\$68), Skyline Honey Locust (\$70), Shade King Red Maple (\$75), and Crimson King Maple (\$75). All trees are a minimum of 2½" in diameter, and come balled, burlapped, wrapped, and guaranteed for one full year. (Applications for the program ended November 5.)
- Annexed 30 lots north of the Glenbrook Hospital site as Westwood Subdivision, zoned for single-family use.
- Confirmed the Mayor's reappointments of Jack Dilworth and George Allen to the Electrical Commission until September 30, 1978, and the appointment of Paul G. Parker to the same Commission until September 30, 1977.
- Deferred sidewalk construction on Spruce between Linneman and Robin Crest until further development has taken place there.

GLENVIEW'S NEW PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR

Stephen Pudloski, Glenview's new Public Works Director, began working with us on October 6. A licensed professional engineer, he is a Civil Engineering graduate of Illinois Institute of Technology, and is now completing requirements for a Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh.

His past experience includes working as a civil engineer for the City of Milwaukee for two years, the city of Wauwatosa (Wisconsin) for three years, and as executive assistant to the Dean of the Graduate School of the University of Pittsburgh. He was selected from a field of 45 applicants.

His wife Beth, who holds a B.A. in Fine Arts History, has been a teacher of both fine arts and French. They have two sons, Steve, 10, and Rob, 8, who are now attending Westbrook School.

## PRE-HOLIDAY CLEANUP

Now is a good time to clean out your basement, attic, garage, and other storage areas, and dispose of obsolete items and all combustible waste materials that could feed a fire.

If you plan to clean walls or floors, don't use flammable products! The Fire Prevention Bureau suggests that you read labels carefully, as there are plenty of safe solvents on the market.

Beware of mixing one product with another. Such things as bleach and solvent mixed together (or used one right after the other) can cause fire or produce toxic gases.

When doing your outdoor cleanup, don't leave grass and brush piled up in your back yard. Put everything out, in disposable containers, for your waste disposal service AFTER 7 PM THE NIGHT BEFORE A SCHEDULED PICKUP DAY.

Before you put away gasoline-fueled equipment (mowers, trimmers, outboard motors, motorcycles, and motorbikes), empty the tanks. Do this OUTDOORS, not in the garage, and NEVER in the basement. DO NOT dump flammable substances down the sewer!

If you have any old paintbrushes, or cloths soaked with paint, oil, or gasoline, put them outdoors for the disposal service on the very next pickup. These things can burst into flame of their own accord (spontaneous combustion) and burn your house down.

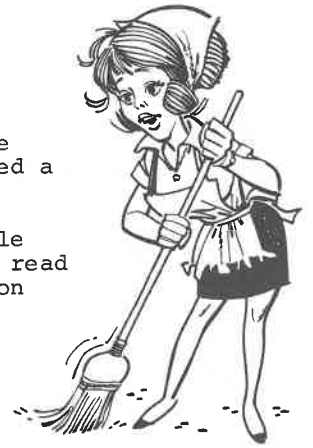
Arrange for your annual furnace maintenance and inspection by a competent heating contractor. Replace furnace filters regularly. A defective or dirty furnace can cause a fire at worst, or — at best — keep you waiting for hours in an icy house while emergency service is on its way some bitter winter night.

Do you know that for about \$50 you can protect your family against nighttime fires? An approved smoke-detecting device will sound an alarm to alert you before toxic gases, smoke, or fire can kill the whole family. Look into the matter. The Fire Prevention Bureau says most houses need only one device, but even if you need two or three in your house, it's a small investment for the safety of your family.

## NEW RULES FOR RECYCLING!

The Glenview Recycling Center closes November 10 because we have lost the use of the present site and are unable to find another suitable location.

DO NOT THROW AWAY RECYCLABLE MATERIALS!

From now on, please take your recyclable materials to either of these two centers:

- NORTHFIELD ... 312 Happ Road,  $\frac{1}{4}$  block south of the Willow-Happ Roads intersection.

Hours are 10 AM - 4 PM Mondays through Fridays, and 9 AM - 4 PM Saturdays; closed Sundays (*but you may leave things outside the closed door*).

- NILES WEST HIGH SCHOOL ... Oakton and Austin intersection, west of the high school athletic field.

Hours are 12 Noon - 5 PM Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, and 8 AM to 5 PM Saturdays. Closed on Sundays.

Both centers take the following materials, provided you separate them:

- PAPER (including newspaper, brown paper, cardboard, and phone books) should be bagged — no string or wire, please. No carbon paper, waxed paper, or any kind of paper that has contained food.
- CANS should be rinsed clean with labels removed, and flattened if possible. Tin and aluminum are O.K.
- GLASS of all colors acceptable as long as it is clean, with all plastic and metal removed. Paper labels need not be removed. (Clear glass only, please — NO CHINA.)

## RIDE THE NORTRAN BUSES!

You can save about \$2,000 a year by riding NORTRAN buses instead of driving your car! All buses are new as of September 1, and the fare is 45¢ for short runs, \$1 to the Chicago Loop. Four routes service Glenview, two going to the Davis Street El Station in Evanston and two going to the Loop via the Outer Drive.
