GLENVIEW OFFICIALS BREAK GROUND

FOR NEW POLICE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

Glenview's new Police Administration Building is now officially under construction at 1215 Waukegan Road, after a ground-breaking ceremony January 3 attended by Village officials and representatives of the architect (A. M. Kinney Associates) and the general contractor (Ockerlund Construction Company).

The building will be of a highly functional design that provides public and security areas in two separate structures joined by a below-grade operating level. It should be completed later this year. A model is on display at the Glenview Public Library.

SINCE YOUR LAST REPORT

The Glenview Trustees...

- Authorized the purchase of property at 1227-29 Waukegan Road for future Village use.
- Applied to the federal government for eligibility for Glenview property owners to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program. (See following article for details.)

NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM

As of January 26, when federal approval was received, Glenview property owners are eligible to purchase federally subsidized National Flood Insurance under a program administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Flood insurance policies may now be bought from any licensed property and casualty insurance agent or broker in Illinois, in units up to \$17,500 for single-family residential structures (including town and row houses) and up to \$30,000 for all other structures.

Contents coverage is available at subsidized rates in amounts up to \$5,000 per unit, and may be bought by either owner or tenant.

Please note that policies cover only losses resulting from general flooding (i.e., a general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land areas). Sewer backup losses are not covered, except where a general condition of flooding exists and the sewer backup is clearly a result of the general flooding.

VILLAGE HALL OPEN TWO SATURDAYS

Four presentations will be made:

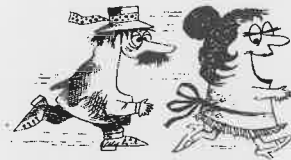
- The 1972 Glenview Youth Awards (NEW THIS YEAR)

DO YOU KNOW THE CLOSEST WATER HYDRANT TO YOUR HOME? You should. Find out where it is, and make sure it is kept clear of snow now, and of foliage next spring and summer.

DON'T BE DUPED !

By and large, general contractors working in this area are fine, reputable business men. But the Glenview Building Department warns that home owners should be alert for those illegal - or just barely legal - contractors whose salesmen begin drumming up business every spring.

Some are no better than con men, canvassing an area and turning over the signed contracts to a finance company. (Your payments begin the following month, but the work may never get started.)

If you have home repair or remodeling work to be done, *don't sign a contract* until you check the reputability of the contractor. Upon request, the Glenview Building Department will give you names and addresses of the last three people for whom the contractor has worked. These references will be far more reliable than any the contractor himself may give you ... as he will, of course, pick out only satisfied customers.

Check out the references carefully to make sure the buyers were satisfied with the work, the time it took, and the price. Even after checking references, you'd be wise to have your lawyer examine the contract *before* you sign anything. After signing, make sure the contractor obtains the proper permits from the Village Hall.



Glenview Fire Department gives

YEAR-END REPORT OF ACTIVITIES



Newest Glenview Fireman is Bert Wells, who joined the Department Dec. 18.

The Glenview Fire Department estimates that Glenview's fire losses in 1972 totalled \$54,540, as compared to \$77,267 in 1971. There were no fire fatalities, and have been none since 1969. Four injuries due to fire were sustained in 1972 (there were 9 in 1971).

Village alarms during the year totalled 621, as against 475 in 1971. The Department answered 298 rescue and emergency calls (189 in '71).

Two vacancies were filled, and 6 more men were also added to the staff. All shifts are now up to full complement of 8 men each.

Many of the men are working hard toward advancement. Nine have become licensed Emergency Medical Technicians under a program administered by the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons.

Glenview firemen have toured every multiple-family building in the Village, and have made safety inspections in about 50 single-family houses. Baby-sitter training has been conducted, with help from the Police Department and Park District.

PUBLIC WORKS TALLIES ACTIVITIES

The Glenview Public Works Department had, in many respects, a dramatically busier year in 1972 than in previous years. For example, it spent 1,463 hours plowing streets (against 745 hours during 1971), and 126 hours plowing sidewalks (against 61 in '71). Parkway maintenance took 2,538 hours during '72 (1,648 in '71).

The Department rodded 241,208 feet of sanitary sewer in 1972, against only 60,710 in '71 (thanks to some helpful new equipment), and flushed 9,114 feet of storm sewer, against 454 feet in 1971.

In fighting Dutch Elm Disease in 1972, the Department applied 2,875 gallons of mix, compared with 1,750 during 1971.

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More than 3,000 cubic yards of leaves were collected, at Village expense, during our special fall leaf collection period last year.
