Receiving the Citizen of 1972 Award was Glenview resident Frank V. Siler, who distinguished himself for having served, for more than 15 years, as volunteer swimming instructor and coach at the Glenview Playdium.

The Glenview Youth Award - something new this year - went to Glenview resident Terry G. Stewart for his Glenbrook South High School leadership of Key Club, a teenage service club of which he is an international officer and regional governor, responsible for advising some 200 clubs.

The Public Service Award was presented to Northfield resident Alice Reiss, who organized the Glenview Recycling Center and has operated it from the beginning with outstanding success. The Center is now a Village operation, but Alice Reiss is still its manager.

John L. Demand of Wheeling, a member of the Glenview police force, received the Public Safety Award for his part in solving a case involving two men who destroyed a car and part of a house with a home-made bomb. Solving this case led, in turn, to solving 8 other bombings and 11 north shore burglaries.

#### CLEAN UP - FOR YOUR VERY LIFE!

Household rubbish - "wornouts," "outgrowns," and "castoffs" - can not only clutter our homes. They can burn them to the ground. They are not only rubbish ... they are fire-feeders.

Keep your everyday trash in covered containers and *away from fire sources or stairs*. Empty these containers often.

Right now, begin checking your attic for old rugs, draperies, mattresses, lamp shades, toys, clothing, and costumes. Check the closets for old games, wallpaper remnants, Christmas boxes, old bedding, and so on. Check the garage and basement for old cans of paint, oily cloths, wood scraps, piles of old papers, and other junk. Don't risk a do-it-yourself fire!

Check outdoors, too. Get rid of piles of old wood, worn tires, dead grass and other yard debris.

In each case, ask yourself this: is it worth keeping if it is going to cause or feed a fatal fire? Chief Ken Wood of the Glenview Fire Department has the facts, and he knows this: *a clean house seldom burns.*

### VILLAGE ELECTION COMING UP

Village Election Day is Tuesday, April 17, when the polls will be open from 6 AM to 6 PM. Precinct 8's polling place, formerly Skjold Lodge, will be St. Peter and Paul Church, corner of East Lake Avenue and Wagner Road.

Two new precincts have been added: Precinct 23, which includes everything recently annexed that is west of Pfingsten *or* south of West Lake; Precinct 24, which includes everything recently annexed that is east of Pfingsten *and* north of West Lake, plus the Glenview Naval Air Station. Precinct 23's polling place is Glenbrook South High School, and Precinct 24's is Willow Park Field House.

Voter registration is closed as of Monday, March 5, and by law must remain closed until Thursday, April 19, two days after the election.

Watch for your April Newsletter, which will carry a precinct map and a complete list of polling places.

### ORAL HYGIENE PROGRAM THIS MONTH

A Demonstration Oral Hygiene Program will be held in District 34 schools and at Our Lady of Perpetual Help School on March 7 and March 14 (two successive Wednesdays).

Each child will be instructed in the proper manner of caring for his teeth at home, and will then brush fluoride paste on his own teeth, under the supervision of a dentist or a nurse.

The program is sponsored jointly by the Glenview Health Department, School District 34, Glenview dentists, and the Illinois Department of Health.

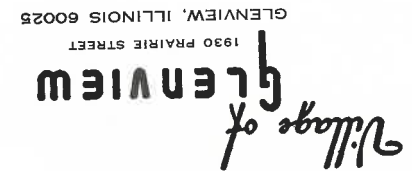

A Remote Reading Device attached to your water meter enables the meter reader to get the necessary information without entering your home. You don't have to answer the door, or mail in a card if you weren't at home when the meter reader called.

You may have the device installed at a total cost of \$17, simply by calling the Public Works Department at 724-1700. Why not make your life easier?
