GLENVIEW'S DENTAL PROGRAM SUCCEEDS

During the recent oral hygiene program in District 34 and at Our Lady of Perpetual Help School (March 7 and 14), 90 classrooms in 8 schools were visited by 24 volunteer Registered Nurses and Dentists, who gave 2,289 children instruction in dental health; 1,814 children used the selfapplied fluoride paste.


The program was sponsored by the Glenview Health Department, the Illinois Department of Public Health, and School District 34. Glenview Health Educator Jean Voght coordinated the program.

There is a one-time fee of 25¢ per pupil, payable at the first session. Hours are 7 to 8:30. Those who complete the course will be awarded certificates of attendance.



GLENVIEW COOPERATES WITH SAVE-A-PET

Stray animals picked up in Glenview are now held for five days for possible identification, and are then taken to Save-a-Pet, Inc., in Highland Park, where they receive expert care before being put up for adoption.

Females are spayed, and all necessary shots are given to animals of both sexes. No animal in Save-a-Pet's care has yet been put to death.

Glenview is one of fourteen north shore communities now cooperating with the Save-a-Pet program. The others are Northbrook, Northfield, Skokie, Mt. Prospect, Deerfield, Wilmette, Kenilworth,

Winnetka, Glencoe, Highland Park, Highwood, Lake Bluff, and Lake Forest.

Dennis Goessele, Glenview's Animal Control Officer, believes Save-a-Pet is an excellent program, and he urges Glenview residents to find out more about it and help in any way possible. Of course you are helping indirectly by calling the Glenview Police (724-2131) whenever you find a stray animal in Glenview.

LOCUSTS DUE BACK IN JUNE

You may have been wondering about the so-called 17-year locusts, and when they are coming again. Actually, the periodical cicada (to call it by its rightful name) emerges someplace in the U.S. every year.

But this June, according to University of Illinois scientists, a heavy emergence of brood number 13 of the "17-year locust" is due to appear in this area. The last emergence was in 1956, and you may remember the devastation that resulted. In some areas of Chicagoland, counts ranged as high as one and a half million cicadas per acre. Tree damage was visible for many years thereafter, and many trees did not survive.

There are several sprays available to control the voracious pests. Call your tree or garden service for an appointment (the professionals know just when to come around and spray your property), or if you plan to do the job yourself, see your garden supply dealer for the necessary equipment and information.

You won't be able to prevent insects from flying into your yard, but you can effectively control those that emerge there, and the experts say most damage is done by the insects on their home ground.

DUTCH ELM DISEASE IS STILL WITH US. If your elms are not leafing out this spring, have them checked immediately by your tree service. Dead elms are a threat to all the healthy ones in the area. If your elms are still alive, by all means spray them this spring. The Public Works Department is spraying all parkway elms, as it does every year.
