is new Glenview Trustee

Former suburban newspaperman turned Chicago public relations consultant, Chuck Loebbaka is now a Glenview Trustee. He was appointed May 21 for two years, to complete the unexpired term of Edward K. Patten, who was elected Village President April 17.

Loebbaka, a journalism graduate of the University of Illinois, worked for Star publications (Chicago south suburban papers), Hollister publications, and the Pioneer Press. His last news position was that of executive editor for eleven north suburban newspapers.

He is currently in business for himself at 111 East Wacker Drive, Chicago, under the name of Hallmark Public Relations.

The Loebbakas, Chuck and his wife Diana, have lived in Glenview nine years and are parents of three sons, Brad (13), Jeff (11), and Teddy (7).

Are you entitled to a VILLAGE TAX REFUND ?

Last year the Village refunded half the Village tax levy to residents of the area annexed to Glenview by referendum in June of 1971, because these residents were in the Village for only half a year.

Prior to the annexation, Glenview had agreed to abate 5¢ of the corporate fund tax levy by creating a special taxing district, if the referendum area was required by law to remain in the Rural Fire District. (Continued inside)

The state legislature has not yet authorized creation of special tax districts, so Glenview will refund 5¢ times the equalized assessed valuation to each property owner in the referendum area, for the tax year 1972.

In order to claim a refund, a property owner in the referendum area (that annexed by the June, 1971, referendum) must mail a photocopy of the 1972 tax bill to the Finance Department, Glenview Village Hall. Most refunds will be between \$5 and \$10, depending upon individual assessed valuations.

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES...

- Purchased the property at 1233 Waukegan Road, near the new Police Administration Building location.
- Changed Fire Department ranks, creating three captaincies and three lieutenantcies, and abolishing the rank of Fireman II. (Former Firemen II are now lieutenants, and former Lieutenants are now captains.) This makes one captain for each shift, in charge of the shift, and one lieutenant for each shift, in charge of a truck company. It also brings Fire Department ranks into line with ranks of other departments.
- Confirmed the appointment of Charles R. Loebbaka to a two-year term as Village Trustee, to serve the unexpired term of Edward K. Patten, who was elected Village President April 17.

AUCTION!

IT HAPPENED IN GLENVIEW LAST MONTH

- May 2 - Painters used a propane torch to burn paint from exterior walls of a house. Result: a \$1,400 fire that almost reached the attic before the Fire Department could extinguish it.
- May 8 - A Glenview woman cleaned her basement floor with acetone, fumes from which were ignited by the hot water heater. Result: serious burns on the woman's legs and one hand.
- May 9 - A building contractor spread adhesive on a kitchen wall and ceiling, and the gas stove ignited the adhesive. Result: \$2,000 damage.
- May 10 - A mattress and bed ignited while no one was at home. The Fire Department suspects an electric blanket shorted out. Result: \$4,000 damage.
- May 16 - Someone threw a cigaret butt into some shrubbery, and the resulting fire would have destroyed a small building, had the Fire Department not been able to pick it up and move it.

DON'T YOU BE THE NEXT FIRE VICTIM! (*Glenview has a fine Fire Department, but we hope they will not have to pay an emergency call at your house!*)

GLENVIEW'S NO-PARK TRAILER LAW: The Village Code states there shall be no outdoor parking of trailers *more than 5 feet high or 26 feet long, including bumper and hitch*. If you own a trailer with either of these dimensions, you are permitted to park it in the open for only *48 hours* (for loading, unloading, cleaning, or repairs), *PROVIDED* you notify the Building Department as to when the trailer will be moved in and out.

A WORD ABOUT WEEKENDS

Weekends are the time many suburbanites do their home, lawn, and gardening chores. But they are also the time when neighbors entertain visitors and real estate people are showing houses to prospective residents.

In order to preserve the beauty of our Village this summer, it is suggested that we put our weekend debris out for pickup after dark on Sunday nights, for pickup Monday mornings.

TORNADO WARNING means a tornado has actually been sighted, and you should take cover. At home, go to the basement. If you have no basement, go to the center of the house and, if possible, get under a piece of sturdy furniture. Keep away from windows! If you're out shopping, get out of your car and go to a *small* building. In open country, move away from the tornado at a right angle, or lie flat in the deepest depression you can quickly find. Although May is considered the peak month for tornadoes, they can occur at any time during the summer months.
