TRUSTEES ESTABLISH HEALTH DEPARTMENT *replacing appointive Board of Health*

#62 - July 1973

On June 18 the Glenview Board of Trustees established a new executive department of Village administration, the Glenview Health Department. It replaces the former appointive Board of Health.

The change in no way diminishes the number or quality of public health services previously provided. Rather, it provides certain advantages as to administration, supervision, personnel, and services.

Public Works Director Lee Baur, himself a licensed Sanitarian, now becomes Health Administrator, eliminating the need for a part-time employee for that function. Mr. Baur assumes the additional responsibility without added compensation.

Health Educator Jean Voght, formerly a part-time employee, becomes a full-time employee, the additional time to be devoted to her new duties as Coordinator of the Glenview Blood Replacement Program.

The post of Village Sanitarian is currently open, but when a Sanitarian is employed, that person will report directly to Mr. Baur, rather than to a board, thus tightening authority, supervision, and efficiency.

As provided by law, a Health Officer will be retained. The part-time Health Clerk will be under direct supervision of the Sanitarian, and the entire department (except for the Health Officer) becomes administrative staff located in the Village Hall, readily available to the public.

In announcing the change, President Patten pointed out that the timing coincides with expiration of terms of all members of the Board of Health except the chairman.

President Patten then extended the Village Board's sincere gratitude to Board of Health Chairman John F. Roland, Jr., and members James R. McCue, Myrle Hoffman, Dr. George Brebis, and Dr. John E. Zur, praising their able leadership in revitalizing the unit.

- June 8 Lawnmower refueled while still hot. Result, lawnmower destroyed by fire.

- July 4 (plus or minus a few days) Parents give fireworks to children.
Results, burns, injuries to limbs, faces, and eyes, and property
damage from fireworks-caused fires. Possible death.

Since your last report

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES...

- Changed the name of Washington Street near John Springman Junior High School (between Central and Golf Roads) to Washington Road.
- Proposed a lease agreement (\$1 per year) for recently acquired Village property at 1233 Waukegan Road (for a teen-age drop-in center) with Youth Services of Glenview, Inc., a non-profit organization.
- Filed a legal objection to rezoning of 7.5 acres on the east side of Milwaukee Avenue south of Winkelman Road (site of the former Bornhoff Dairy) for truck maintenance, car grooming, and auto repair.
- Authorized the Village Attorney to file a petition seeking to intervene, as a party for the defense in Cook County Circuit Court, in opposition to rezoning of 1.4 acres on the east side of Dearlove Road north of Central Road for multiple-family dwellings.
- Approved annual agreement to service State highways within the Village limits and receive an increased amount of reimbursement this year.
- Accepted a Bid from A. B. Dick Company for an offset press (\$6,726) for the use of the Fire Department in printing official Village materials.

DISEASED ELM TREES?

If an elm tree on your own property or on adjacent parkway property looks diseased or dead, call the Public Works Department, 724-1700, and report it.

The Public Works Department will test the tree for Dutch Elm Disease. If your own tree is diseased, you will receive test results free, but you must remove the tree yourself. If a parkway tree is diseased, the Village will take care of the removal.

HAVE YOU NOTICED ...?

The Glenview Road - Church Street intersection has now been signalized, providing an interruption in the Glenview Road traffic flow. Pedestrians may now press a button to cross, and motorists may now turn with greater ease into Glenview Road from Church Street and from River Road.

Traffic from Grove and Dewes Streets is now able to enter or cross Glenview Road via Church Street, easing some of the congestion at the Glenview - Pine intersection (where Pine Street runs north from Glenview Road).
