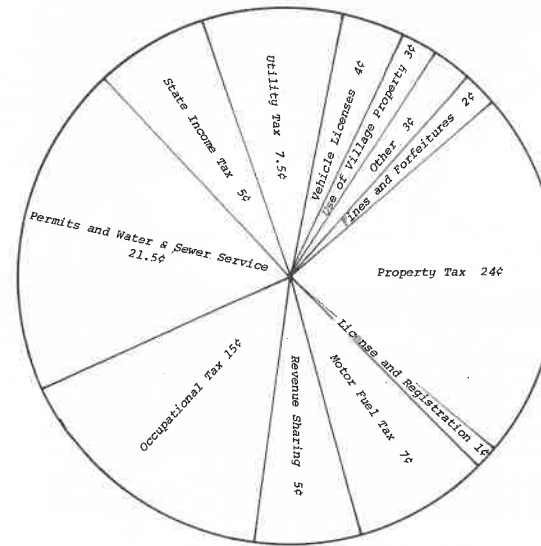


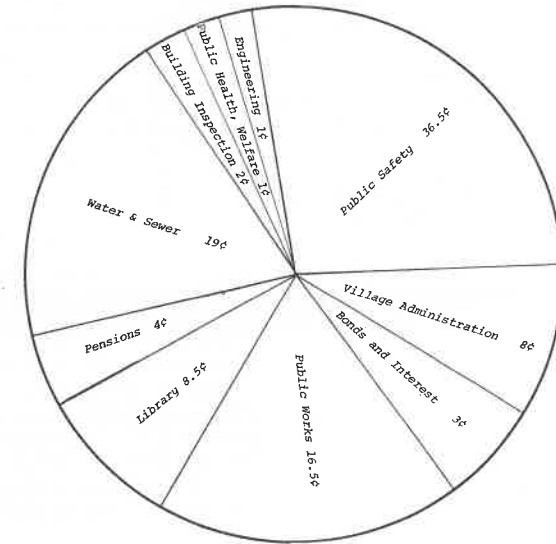


GLENVIEW'S REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES

OPEN HOUSE INVITATION

You are invited to the Glenview Fire Department's annual Open House, to be held at the Fire Station, 1815 Glenview Road, on Saturday, October 13, from 10 AM until 1 PM. Door prizes will be offered, and the winners will receive them the following week.

PLEASE NOTE that children under 14 must be accompanied by parents at all times during their stay. If firemen have to respond to an alarm during the Open House, parents must be present to keep small children out of the way of men and equipment.

The occasion for the Open House is FIRE PREVENTION WEEK (October 7-13), which includes the 102nd anniversary of the tragic Chicago Fire. During the week the Fire Department will conduct safety programs in all Glenview schools, including nursery schools and the Park District's pre-school.

Safety presentations to employees of certain Glenview businesses are being planned.

Glenview has had no fire fatalities since 1969, though there have been several fire-related injuries every year. Chief Kenneth Wood and his able firefighters continuously strive to improve the record, but they need your help.

SPECIAL CITATION FOR GLENVIEW



Glenview Police Chief William P. Bartlett (left) receives a special citation from Donald F. Reynolds, Regional Director of the Chicago Motor Club. The award was made because Glenview has had six pedestrian fatality-free years in a row — an enviable record unique among North Shore communities. "Credit the patrolmen of the Glenview Police Department and all the citizens of Glenview," says Chief Bartlett. "Records like this one are the result of cooperative effort. We sincerely hope to preserve our good record for many years to come."

DO YOU HAVE A HOUSE NUMBER?

Of course you have a house number — but in some cases, nobody would ever know! It may have fallen off, been painted over, or hidden by shrubbery. Worst of all, at night — when friends want to call, or the Fire or Police Department may have to answer an emergency call — your number may not be properly illuminated. In such a case, help cannot reach you promptly.

So it is a matter of necessity as well as a courtesy to your friends to have your house number plainly readable *at all times*. (Anyway, Village law says you must.)

So check those house numbers right now, and leave your porch or post light on at night. The cost is extremely small, and the energy consumed is minimal. Besides, it could save your life.

COUNTY ZONING DECISIONS IN NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP

Cook County Commissioners have denied rezoning (from single-family to multiple-family use) for a proposed development at the south end of Old Willow Road adjoining the west fork of the north branch of the Chicago River. Glenview trustees had opposed the rezoning.

The County Board also denied rezoning the Bornhoff Dairy property from single-family to light-manufacturing use. Glenview trustees had also opposed this rezoning.

The Commissioners granted rezoning for a multiple-family planned development on 27.5 acres at Sanders Road and Milwaukee Avenue. The petitioner asked that zoning be changed from light-manufacturing to high-density multiple-family use in the R-6 (up to 43 units per acre) classification. Granted was an R-5 zoning (17 units per acre), less dense than requested by the applicant. Glenview trustees had opposed the rezoning to multiple-family use.
