Eventually the "PED XING" signs will be removed, leaving the pictograph to speak for itself.

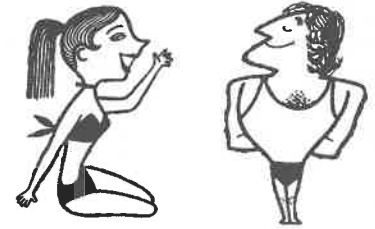
Pictographs have been used as traffic signs in Europe for many years, and are now being introduced to the United States as the most efficient method of communicating with motorists.

The Village Trustees . . .

- Fixed waste disposal rate ceilings.
- Passed a real and personal property tax levy of \$866,950 for 1972 (to be collected in 1973).
- Confirmed the following appointments:
 - To the Zoning Board of Appeals, to complete the term of Dr. Justen, who resigned, ARTHUR A. OLSON of 621 Glenridge Drive. He has lived in Glenview for 19 years and been active in community affairs during that time. He is a Chicago attorney. His term expires June 30, 1973.
 - To the Fire and Police Commission, ROBERT L. SPALDING of 2430 Greenfield Drive. He has lived in Glenview for 13 years and been active in church and school affairs. He is associated with a Wilmette bank. His term expires April 30, 1975.
 - To the Environmental Quality Advisory Group, for terms ending August 21, 1973: VIRGINIA BECKWITH of 1421 London Lane, an 18-year resident and mother of 3, with responsible participation in Northwestern University alumni, church, and homeowner affairs; DICK BRICKMAN, JR., of 1211 Gladish Lane, a 35-year resident and father of 4, member of Theodore W. PARKWAY TREE PROGRAM

You are invited to share the cost, on a 50-50 basis, of planting parkway trees on Village property adjacent to your premises. Five different species of trees are available — Redmond Linden (\$30), Thornless Honey Locust (\$31), Red Oak (\$37.50), Hackberry (\$31), and Kentucky Coffee (\$31). Prices stated here are your share — 50% of the total cost.

The Glenview Public Works Department will furnish and plant the trees, and guarantee them for one year, but reserves the right to reject unsuitable parkway locations (as maintenance is a Village responsibility). Public Works director L. R. Baur says that, as excessive watering is not good for young trees, you should not apply this year if you have new sod on your parkway. (Water the sod well, and apply for trees in 1973.) Application forms are now available at the Village Hall.
