CHURCH STREET EXTENSION COMPLETED

The extension of Church Street from Glenview Road to Dewes Street, originally recommended in 1959 and reconfirmed by studies in 1968 and 1969, is now a reality.

The Glenview Road — Church Street intersection will be signalized this winter or early next spring, providing an interruption in the Glenview Road traffic flow, which will help pedestrians cross, as well as help motorists make turns into Glenview Road from Church Street and River Road. Traffic from Grove and Dewes Streets will also be able to enter or cross Glenview Road via Church Street, easing some of the congestion at the Glenview-Pine intersection (where Pine Street runs north from Glenview Road).

When the proposed Police Administration Building on Waukegan Road is completed, the Fire Station will be enlarged to the west and south of its present location, and Pine Street south of Glenview Road will be closed north of the alley, creating a 40-foot wide pedestrian mall. Two-way traffic will be maintained on the south half of the block, via the alley, the drive at the rear of the bank building, and East Railroad Avenue.

All changes are designed to reduce traffic congestion on Glenview Road and to facilitate access to the central area of the Village. A new 40-car parking lot has been completed at Pine and Dewes Streets. Half the spaces are reserved for police and fire personnel, and the other half are for public use.

Washington Street has been repaved, and 50 additional parking spaces (for Village residents only) will be added at the Milwaukee railroad station. The new "kiss and ride" parking area on Lehigh Avenue, opposite the depot, has now been completed. "Kiss and ride" parking is limited to 30 minutes.

SINCE YOUR LAST REPORT

The Glenview Trustees . . .

- Amended the zoning ordinance to regulate commercial lights to comfortable limits of brightness.
- Awarded contracts to Di Paolo Company of Niles for water main improvements on Spruce Street north of Glenview Road (\$18,315) and on Waukegan Road from Pleasant Lane to Wildberry (\$60,527), and to Wood Electric Construction of Chicago for traffic signals at the Glenview Road - Church Street intersection (\$27,503.65).
- Filed objections with the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals re proposed rezoning of 28 acres on Potter Road north of Lake Avenue (unincorporated Northfield Township) for multiple-family housing, and of a half acre at the southeast corner of Meadow Lane and Central Road (unincorporated Maine Township) for use as a neighborhood food store site.

THE GLENVIEW RECYCLING CENTER will accept Christmas boxes and wrappings, provided they are not laminated with foil or plastic, and if they are well flattened and securely tied. They should be placed with magazines. Please put only brown bags and flattened corrugated boxes into the corrugated container. REMINDER: The Center still wants your newspapers, magazines, office paper, junk mail, and cereal boxes, either bagged or bound with twine. It also wants flattened cans (aluminum separate from steel, please), and glass without lids or metal bands. (The Center does accept the lids and bands, but in separate containers.) THE GLENVIEW RECYCLING CENTER is still located behind the food mart, on the corner of Dewes and Harlem.

NOW THAT WINTER'S HERE, remember the Village ordinance that says snow may not be placed so as to narrow the traveled portion of any roadway, prevent parking against any curb, cover or interfere with any fire hydrant, block any walk or driveway, damage any parkway tree, sod, or curb, or create any hazard due to snow plowing or snow clearance.
