SINCE YOUR LAST REPORT  
The Village Trustees . . .

- Obtained an injunction requiring the Glenview Bus Company to comply with Village laws against open-lot parking of fleet vehicles at its present location. The company has been given adequate time to seek a new site.
- Vacated the alley at 800 Waukegan Road, for a consideration of \$16,450, to make way for the new building of the Glenview State Bank. (Remainder of the alley is for use of residents of the abutting property only, and will be posted as "No Thoroughfare.")
- Rezoned properties at 2417 and 2429 Glenview Road from R-4 to R-18 for construction of a four-unit town house covering both properties. (Location is the south side of Glenview Road just east of Shermer.)
- Passed a tax levy ordinance for the fiscal year 1971-72. Total property tax to be levied is \$807,819. (Grand total of Village appropriations for the year is set at \$2,892,194, of which \$2,084,375 is payable from sources other than property taxation.)
- Referred to the Plan Commission for a September 14 Public Hearing: a pre-annexation agreement for 94 lots at the southwest corner of Lake Avenue and Pfingsten Road, south of Glenbrook South High School. The property, formerly known as Glenbrook Estates, is now called La Fontaine.
- Annexed the Kohl property, one lot at 1944 Glen Oak Drive, per recommendation of the Plan Commission.
- Approved the O'Halloran Subdivision, two lots at Pfingsten Road and Lawson Road (private).
- Requested the United States Postal Service to serve from the Glenview Post Office the area recently annexed to Glenview. (Some residents of the annexed area have been served from the Northbrook Post Office.)
- Requested Illinois Bell Telephone to provide service from the Glenview exchange to the newly annexed area.

### RECYCLING CENTER SMASH SUCCESS!

Here's the score for the Glenview Recycling Center in the parking lot of the A-Mart (Glenview Road and Harlem Avenue) so far: in July, 12½ tons of glass, 4 tons of metal, and 40 tons of paper were collected.

During the first two weeks of August, 19 tons of glass had already been turned in! Looks as though Glenview residents are environmentally oriented.

### STOP SMOKING CLINICS

The Glenview Health Department announces a 5-day "Stop Smoking" clinic September 12-16 at Maine East High School, Potter and Dempster, Park Ridge. If you wish to register, call 696-3600. There is a \$5 fee.

The Glenview Health Department has arranged for the Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital to conduct a one-evening "Stop Smoking" clinic here in Glenview, at 7:30 PM on September 29, at the Glenview Community Church, 1000 Elm. There will be no charge for this program.

### CANCER CHECKUP

The Glenview Health Department, in cooperation with the Evanston-North Shore Health Department and the American Cancer Society, urges you to take advantage of the cancer checkup for adults on Wednesday, October 13, 6:30-9:30 PM at St. Francis Hospital, 355 Ridge, Evanston.

Individual examinations last about half an hour and will detect curable cancers of skin, head, neck, breast, cervix, uterus and rectum. Your test results will be mailed to your own personal physician.

A \$5 Registration Fee is the only cost for the examination. For your appointment please call the American Cancer Society office at DA 8-5147. Mrs. LaVonne Cook, Glenview's Health Educator, is one of the many north shore health officials helping to administer this important program.

### DID YOU KNOW THAT ... ?

If you own a rotary mower, you can use a leaf-collection bag and both mulch and gather leaves simultaneously. Leaf volume will be reduced by the mulching process about four to one.

In other words, by using a rotary mower you will have only one bag of leaves instead of four for the collectors to remove from your property.

The men have recently completed recruit training consisting of 56 hours per week for three successive weeks, and are now on regular company assignments.

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#### GOOD NEWS FOR 2 SUBDIVISIONS

Willows and Willows West Subdivisions, in the past served by one water main on Pfingsten Road, are soon to have an additional main on Landwehr Road. Miller Builders have let a contract to install a new loop main. Work begins immediately and should be completed in a few weeks.

The improvement means that in case of a future break, service to both subdivisions can be continued without interruption while the break is being repaired.



#### FALL POLICE TRAINING

Officer STEPHEN J. HALLS of the Glenview Police Department (pictured at right) is one of a class of 87 men chosen to attend the 1971-72 Traffic Police Administration Training Program at the Traffic Institute of Northwestern University.

In his class will be officers from 21 state and 36 municipal law enforcement agencies in the United States, the Philippines, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, as well as officials from Johannesburg and Transvaal (in South Africa), Thailand and Singapore.

Traffic Institute Director James M. Slavin says this is the second largest class in the Institute's 35-year history. The 81 United States officers were selected from 390 applicants.



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Patrolmen LOUIS BARTH and JOHN BITCON will attend a Traffic Institute course on Accident Investigation to be held September 13 through October 1.

The study will cover traffic law, classification of motor vehicle accidents, photography and diagramming.

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Patrolmen JOSEPH GAFFRIG, MICHAEL O'CONNELL and ERNEST PIETROWIAK will take Basic Recruit Training at the Northwest Police Academy in Arlington Heights October 4 through November 26.

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All Glenview police training participation is made possible by State grants, which disburse federal funds allotted to local police departments throughout the United States under the Law Enforcement Assistance Act.

## BACK TO SCHOOL -- PREPARED!

Glenview Police Chief WILLIAM P. BARTLETT says that it is the responsibility of parents to prepare school children in more ways than buying them clothes, pencils and notebooks.

Children, who walk to school should be told what route to take. Parents should check the route first to see what hazards there are, and should explain these thoroughly and tell children what precautions should be taken on every trip to and from school.

Children who ride bicycles to school should be taught these rules:

- Walk your bike -- do not ride it -- across intersections in Glenview.
- Ride with the traffic flow.
- Ride as close to the curb as possible.
- Ride single file if there is anyone else with you.

All school children should be firmly instructed by parents to obey the adult Crossing Guards.

Proper parental training in safety will stay with a child into adulthood -- and his chances of reaching adulthood will be much better.

Chief Bartlett points out that while Glenview has a good record in regard to safety of school children as compared with neighboring villages, we have added (by the recent referendum) Willowbrook Elementary School and Glenbrook South High School. He is anxious to keep our record good, even with the greater number of school children now within Village limits.

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## MORE CROSSING GUARD JOBS OPEN

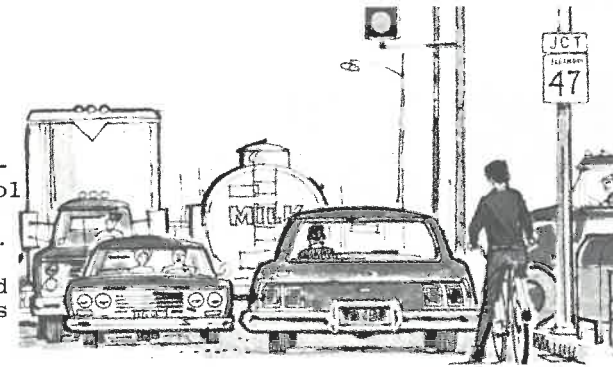


Glenview is larger and has more schools and school children than ever before ... so it needs more adult Crossing Guards than ever before. A few vacancies still exist.

Serving as a Crossing Guard is more than just a paying job (it pays \$160 per month for three or four hours on school days only). It is also an important community service, performed under happy and healthy conditions agreeable to any active adult.

The Glenview Police Department, under which Crossing Guards work, furnishes them with caps, safety jackets and stop signal signs -- and the children themselves furnish the job satisfaction. (Many school children regard their Crossing Guard as an important member of the school team, and he or she is that, too.)
