The photos at your right are of a fine old shade tree growing on Village Hall property, directly across the street from the Glenview Post Office.

The top photo (note arrow) shows how a steel rod has been placed through two of the main branches, to prevent further splitting of the main trunk, a remedy that will probably prolong its life.



The bottom photo shows how the trunk has been repaired near the ground, by means of removing diseased or dead wood and replacing it with concrete brickwork. This, also, should prolong the tree's life span.

The surgery was performed last fall by Glenview Forester RON REHLING and Public Works Department employee BOB LIND. It shows you how your Village Forester is able to go to some lengths to save old trees on public property in the Village. (Elms and silver maples are not candidates for tree surgery, due to the short life expectancy of both species.)

If you have a damaged or elderly tree worth saving on the parkway adjacent to your property, call Village Forester Rehling at the Glenview Village Hall during business hours. He will examine the tree and attempt to save its life, or prolong its life, by means of tree surgery.



SINCE YOUR LAST REPORT,
The Glenview Board of Trustees . . .

Adopted the 1968 National Electric Code, replacing the 1962 version.

Approved a resolution requesting authorization for the use of Motor Fuel Tax funds, to acquire property so that the Church Street extension (to Dewes Street) can be realized.

Approved an agreement with Harland Bartholomew & Associates (as recommended by the Plan Commission) for continuing land use planning service for one year on a per diem basis, the total amount not to exceed \$5,000.

Requested a recommendation from the Plan Commission regarding amending the Village Comprehensive Plan so as to incorporate the recommendations of the Northfield Township Comprehensive Plan.

Confirmed the appointment of RICHARD A. YOUNG to the post of Consultant on Environmental Quality. Mr. Young, a Glenview resident, is the Editor of Pollution Engineering Magazine, an international publication devoted to air, water and noise pollution control and solid waste disposal, and of nine books on the subject of environmental engineering. He is the pollution control officer for the Village of Bensenville, and has acted as environmental advisor for several dozen small municipalities and two air quality control regions. As part of his services to the Village, Mr. Young will make himself available to speak to Glenview organizations. Written requests should be addressed to Mr. Young in care of the Glenview Village Hall.

THIRD ANNUAL GLENVIEW CIVIC AWARDS NIGHT HELD

Glenview's third annual Civic Awards night was held February 5 at the North Shore Country Club. Master of Ceremonies was the Honorable Judge ROBERT J. DOWNING, former Village Attorney. The Pledge of Allegiance was followed by an Invocation by the Reverend WILLIAM J. BUCKLEY, pastor of St. Catherine LaBoure Church. The Glenbrook South High School Chambre Choir provided the music.

Glenview Police Chief WILLIAM P. BARTLETT, who sponsors the event each year in cooperation with the service clubs of Glenview, explained the purpose of the evening, and Glenview Village President PAUL H. THOMAS presented the awards.

Winners were KENNETH B. GATHERCOAL of 1026 Washington Street, for Citizen of the Year; NEAL C. KEMNITZ of 2245 Covert Road, for Public Service; and BRUCE MAC DONALD of 1036 Arbor Lane, for Public Safety. Bruce is only fourteen years old. The winners, recipients of plaques denoting their awards, were selected by a panel of five representative members of the Glenview community.

EDWARD V. HANRAHAN, States Attorney of Cook County, offered congratulations to the three award winners, and the address of the evening was given by ROBERT WEIDRICH, Chicago Tribune columnist.

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1969 HIGHLIGHTS OF THE GLENVIEW POLICE DEPARTMENT

The police traveled a total of 285,890 miles in 1969 -- an increase of 16,360 miles over 1968. (The Village is larger, and so is the force.) ... There were 331 fewer arrests (other than for traffic violations) than in 1968, and 38 fewer stray dogs picked up. (There were 4 fewer animal bites, also.) 178 persons were fingerprinted -- one less than in 1968. ... 8,366 complaints were handled, 947 more than during the previous year. ... Car accidents involving injuries were only 10 more than in 1968, and 118 people were hurt, only 4 more than in '68. And again, as in '68, there were NO fatal accidents. ... We joined the Northern Illinois Police Crime Lab (Highland Park) in May, and it has greatly increased our efficiency. ... Our on-going training program totalled 2,411 hours in 1969.
