BUD SCHWALL of the the Glenview Public Works Department turns the first shovelful of dirt for the ten new parking meters now being installed in the Commuter Plaza, on the east side side of the railroad tracks, just north of the spaces reserved for the Rugen Store customers. In the right background is Rugen's barn.

The newly metered stalls bring to a total of 50 the number of metered parking spaces in the Commuter Plaza.

SPEAKING OF PARKING, Glenview Trustees have restricted on-street parking on the west side of East Railroad Avenue, on the south side of Linneman Street between East Railroad Avenue and Waukegan Road, and on both sides of Overlook Drive west of the Milwaukee Railroad.

These restrictions are required by the State Highway Division for streets to be improved with Motor Fuel Tax funds, and Glenview wishes to utilize your share of the tax money in improving these thoroughfares.

THE BOARD of Trustees has requested the State Highway Division to stabilize shoulders on the three eligible state-maintained highways in the Village, to make two-lane pavements 26 feet wide instead of 20 feet. We have asked that Glenview Road be done first, then Shermer Road, and finally Central Road west of Shermer.

Other state-maintained highways in Glenview are not eligible, as the state's shoulder stabilization program applies only to pavements no more than 20 feet in width.

THE VILLAGE has acquired the Ralph Hoffman property, a 40-foot-wide strip, for \$45,771.80. This piece of land, together with the Peter property acquired a few months ago, make possible the extension of Church Street from Glenview Road to Dewes next year.



VILLAGE ATTORNEY ZACHARY FORD, as directed by the Glenview Board of Trustees, represented the Village at the Public Hearing on the proposed rezoning of 18 acres on the south side of Glenview Road, opposite Glen Grove School, to object to the proposed rezoning for 512 apartment units.

The hearing was held June 15 before the County Zoning Board, in the Northbrook Village Hall. Mr. Ford appeared with witnesses and filed Glenview's objections and the reasons therefor.

THE GLENVIEW HEALTH OFFICER urges you to dispose of any supplies of DDT you may have on your premises.



Small household-size containers of the substance may be placed in your garbage can for regular refuse collection, as state-approved sanitary landfills (where your garbage goes) are safe places for dumping it, according to the Illinois Department of Public Health.

DO NOT dispose of DDT in sink, toilet or floor drains, gutters, roadside ditches, sanitary sewers, storm sewers, streams, lakes or ponds -- because that would cause serious water pollution problems.

DO NOT BURY DDT anywhere on your premises -- because that could seriously harm you and your neighbors.

DO NOT BURN aerosol containers, which will explode when subjected to heat.

The NORTHEASTERN ILLINOIS PLANNING COMMISSION recently completed a study of flooding problems on the north branch of the Chicago River. Your Village officials are negotiating with the Metropolitan Sanitary District and the Cook County Forest Preserve District to provide solutions to this problem.

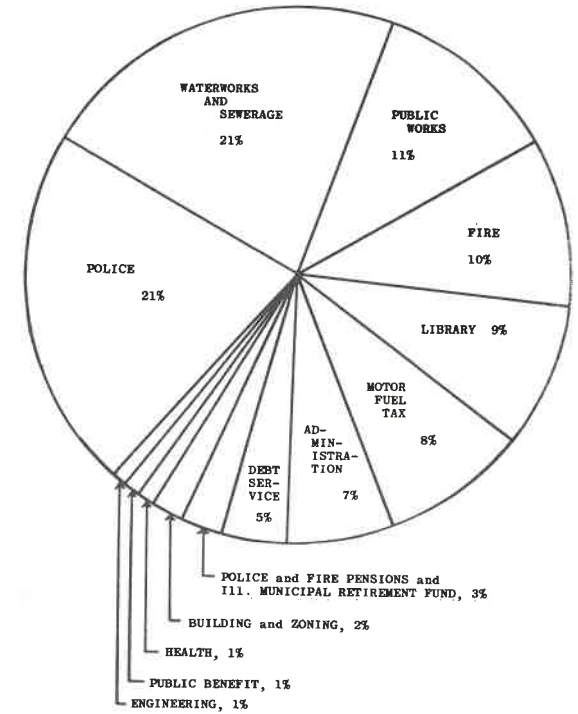
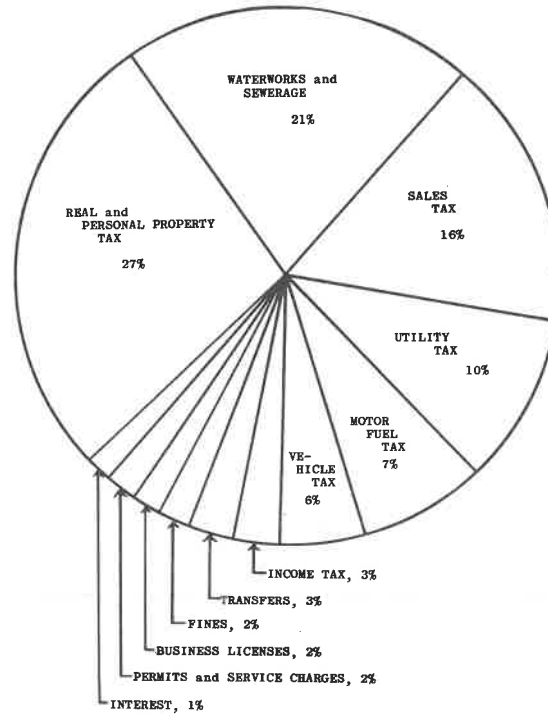
CHIEF KENNETH WOOD of the Glenview Fire Department says:
