APPOINTMENTS MADE TO VILLAGE POSTS

D. CODER TAYLOR (right), 727 Redwood Ln., has been appointed Chairman of the Appearance Commission for a term running until May of 1971.

Taylor, a registered architect in Illinois and 6 other states, engaged in his profession for 30 years, is principal in the firm of Coder Taylor Associates (architects, engineers and planners), Kenilworth. He has lived in Glenview for 16 years. Last year he was president of the Chicago chapter of the American Institute of Architecture. He has previously served Glenview as a member of the Plan Commission.



Four other distinguished Glenview people will serve with Taylor as members of the Appearance Commission: MRS. JOHN ANTOGNOLI (714 Wagner Rd.), professional landscape architect and a 12-year resident; G. A. GRUNDSTROM (2030 Mickey Ln.), president of Grundstrom Co., Inc., Landscape Contractors, and a 30-year resident; G. ROBERT JOHNSON (1046 Heatherfield Ln.), professional architect and engineer, a 16-year resident; and C. RICHARD NASH (2617 Glenview Rd.), professional architect and engineer, who has been a member of the Plan Commission for the past 3 years. President Thomas announced the appointments June 3.

McNOWN REAPPOINTED

GORDON C. McNOWN (left), 1440 Kaywood Ln., has been reappointed to a full term of 3 years on the Fire and Police Commission, and now becomes also the President of the Commission. His term continues until May of 1971.



A Glenview resident for 7½ years, he is Vice President and Controller of Signode Corporation, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, a Certified Public Accountant, and was for 6 years a special agent of the FBI.

He has previously served as a member of the Fire and Police Commission of Ft. Atkinson (Wis.), president of the Civil Service Commission for the Evansville (Ind.) Police Department,

and has been a valued member of Glenview's Fire and Police Commission for the past five years.

OTHER APPOINTMENTS



EMMETT (RAY) BEEBE (left), 2741 Virginia Ln., has been appointed to serve out the unexpired term of Albert Nutt, Fire and Police Commissioner, who has resigned. The term extends until May of 1969.

Beebe has been a Glenview resident since the Park Glen Subdivision, in which he has lived for 10 years, was annexed to the Village. For two years he was President of the Park Glen Civic Association. He is Manager of the manufacturing division of S & C Electric Company.

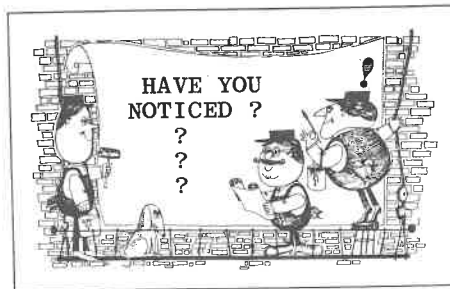

The Glenview Board of Trustees has

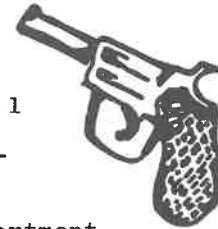
- Rezoned, for 16 single-family residences, 6 acres of land which had originally been planned for business use in the Valley Lo Planned Development.
- Authorized the issuance of 5 additional taxicab licenses (making a total of 20 in all for Glenview), and granting the 5 to David Whitehead of Rosemont.
- Approved Valley Lo Unit 1A, clearing the way for erection of a 10-unit townhouse at 1760 Chestnut Avenue (the entrance to the Valley Lo Planned Development).

- Appearance of Veterans' Memorial Area at River and Glenview Roads . . .

DO YOU OWN A FIREARM? If so, you have until July 1 to register with the State of Illinois. (This is a firearm owner identification — not a gun registration, as is required in Chicago.)



Here's what to do: go to the Glenview Police Department and pick up the Firearm Owners Identification Application form. Fill it out and send, with \$5, to Springfield, Ill. (The proper address is printed on the form.)

You must also supply a 1½ x 1½-inch head-and-shoulders photo of yourself that is "of sufficient likeness for identification."

Get to this important requirement right away ... July 1 is coming up fast.



THE LATE MRS. J. OSKAR RYDSTROM (Eleanor Scheier Rydstrom), pictured at right in American Red Cross uniform, was a resident of Glenview from 1920 until her death in 1958.

She was devoted to the Village, and extremely active in a number of civic groups and religious organizations.

A sizeable hardwood maple tree has now been planted on the grounds of the Village Hall just east of the building. It is Mr. Rydstrom's gift in memory of his wife, and a plaque is attached to the tree identifying it as such.

Glenview is very pleased with this thoughtful and handsome memorial, and Village Trustees have expressed official thanks.

WE KNOW YOUR DOG IS AWFULLY SMART ... but we doubt whether it can read.

So this had better be your responsibility:

Your dog needs a license in Glenview. It costs \$3, and you get it at the Village Hall. It is **IMPORTANT** to you and the dog, because if one of you gets lost, the other one of you can then find whichever of you was lost. (And without a license, Rover is picked up, considered a stray, and our Animal Warden has to notify the Humane Society.)

Licensed or not, though, Fido cannot run loose in Glenview. Unless it's on your own property, your dog must be "held securely on a leash." That's the law.

A final word about walking Towser for the — uh — necessary daily and nightly exercise: remember that your neighbors may not appreciate donations. Try to walk Man's Best Friend in places where he will not become roundly resented.

(Note to dogs only: If your people don't read this to you, why don't you read it to them?)
