THE GLENVIEW BOARD OF TRUSTEES last month passed a resolution authorizing and directing President Thomas "to employ every means at the Village's disposal to protect the citizens ... including all avenues of legal recourse" leading to the complete and absolute defeat of the proposal to transfer the U.S. Air Force Reserves' 928th Tactical Air Group and units of the Illinois Air National Guard to the Glenview Naval Air Station.

THE RESOLUTION pointed out that the number of flights of the ponderous C-119 cargo transports flown by the Tactical Air Group and the KC-97 jet fuel tankers flown by the Air National Guard unit would represent an intolerable overload of air traffic at low altitudes, increasing hazards and noise levels and severely reducing property values in a substantial portion of the Village.

IT ALSO UNDERSCORED the fact that citizens and government of Glenview have for 31 years lived in harmony with the Naval Air Station and have unselfishly accepted community responsibility in the nation's defense program.

THE STRONGLY-WORDED resolution was drawn up by Trustee Edward K. Patten. President Thomas assures all residents that he intends to continue his efforts to defeat the proposal — or any other plan — that would bring further dangers into the air over our town.

PRESIDENT THOMAS urged concerned citizens of Glenview to address letters of protest to Senators Dirksen and Percy and to Congressmen Rumsfeld and Collier.

IF YOU OWN A HOME within the boundaries of the Grove Street Storm Sewer Project or of the Southwest Storm Sewer Project, you should be pleased to know that both have been completed with surpluses. This means that you will receive a rebate. In the case of Grove Street, it amounts to the 10th installment of the Special Assessment. In the case of Southwest, the rebate is equal to the ninth and tenth installments.



If you haven't paid these installments, you can forget them — they're cancelled. If you have paid, refund checks will be sent you by mail, beginning in about six weeks (or after the Cook County Circuit Court approves our corrected assessment roll).

If you have recently sold, or if you do sell your property before the court acts, the rebate will go to the new owner, unless you and the buyer have made some other agreement about it. This is state law.

THE WORK INVOLVED in sending out refunds places something of a burden upon our Village Hall staff, which will begin mailing checks as soon as the court gives the word. Meanwhile, we hope you will be patient. Your check will reach you just as soon as is legally possible.

It enables the meter reader to get his information without entering your home. You need not answer doorbells or mail in cards if you're not at home when he calls. He need not waste time and tax dollars tramping through your house or writing notices.

WE'LL SELL YOU A REMOTE READING DEVICE AT COST, and install it for you — for about \$17 total. So make your application for one at the Village Hall. You'll be glad you did.



PARKWAY TREES — Red Maples, Norway Maples,
Little Leaf Lindens, and
Thornless Honey Locusts —

but no more than two trees per homeowner,
please —

are now being offered for fall planting on a
50/50 plan. This means that you, the resident,
pay only 50% of the cost of the trees, while
the Village pays the other 50%.

ALL TREES ARE GUARANTEED, and the Glenview
Public Works Department maintains them as soon
as they are established.

IF YOU HAVE PLACES on the parkway in front of
your home that you think need trees, notify the
Village Hall NOW. (The offer closes September 19.)

The Public Works Department will decide whether
the spots you have in mind are adequate for the
trees wanted. If so, you and we are in business.

TOTAL COST per tree runs between \$50 and \$60, but
YOUR SHARE will be from \$25 to \$30.

Call for your application blank (Information Desk,
Village Hall) right away. There's \$4,000 in our
tree budget, and when it's gone, that's all for
this year!

HIGHLIGHTS OF AUGUST MEETINGS OF THE GLENVIEW BOARD OF TRUSTEES

RICHARD E. DOBROTH was appointed to the Glenview Plan Commission August 13. Mr. Dobroth is an architect (Richard E. Dobroth & Associates), and the only member of his profession currently serving on this commission. His term runs until July 31 of 1972. ... PRESIDENT THOMAS has appointed a committee to study the matter of possible senior citizens' housing in Glenview. Chairman is HERBERT LOTH, chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals; members are Trustees RICHARD J. CONYNGHAM and H. VERNE LOEPPERT, and Mrs. GWEN TRINDL of the Plan Commission. ... THIRTY-EIGHT PARCELS OF PROPERTY north of Glenwood Avenue and generally located in the area bounded on the east by Sunset Ridge Road and on the west by Waukegan Road (annexed to the Village in July) have been rezoned to Residential Classifications 1 and 3. ... THE TAX LEVY for Fiscal 1968 has been passed by Trustees, in accordance with Illinois law. Grand total is \$700,999. A Utility Tax has been levied, effective October 1 for one year. (A Village referendum next April will propose a Property Tax levy as a substitute. If that carries, the Utility Tax can be abandoned.) ... PLEASE BE ALERT at the intersection of Elmwood Avenue and Canterbury Lane. Elmwood at Canterbury is now designated a STOP street. ... Cars that have obviously been abandoned, as well as cars that have not been in operating condition for at least 6 months, are considered JUNK in Glenview. The Police Department will take action to have them removed from either public streets or private property.



BUT IF YOU NEED TO REGISTER in order to vote in November (that is, if you have moved or changed your name since last registering, or if you have not voted at all for 4 years, or if you have just turned 21) YOU CAN STILL DO SO . . .
